

> The First Half Dollar .- Nailed up over the door of the dining room in the Blanco hotel with a huge spike, the first half dollar taken in that structure after it was finished in 1872 is still a curiosity to numerous visitors at the hotel. It has become tarnished by its 38 years of age, and hardly noticeable until attention is brought to it. The coin was issued in 1871 and a year later the Blanco hotel was opened by James Ferry. As a fortunate omen for the future business of the hostelry the half dollar was nailed over the door and it has remained there ever since.
