First Officer Resigns—First Officer Owens, of the steamer Breakwater, who resigned to return to his old home in Baltimore, has been succeeded by P. Peterson, formerly occupying a similar position on the steamer F. A. Kilburn.

Will Hold a Social—A young people's business meeting and social will be held at the home of Mrs. Stutsman, and a large number of young folks connected with the Baptist and other churches will be present. The gathering is proposed to be instructive and enjoyable.

Hunter Brings Tackle—The tug Hunter, of Gardiner, arrived in the harbor yesterday and brought considerable tackle from the wrecked schooner Novelty which she left at North Bend. After discharging her cargo she arrived at the coal Bunker late in the afternoon.

Coquille Man Here—A. J. Sherwood and wife are visiting in the city and are stopping at the Blanco hotel. Mr. Sherwood is a large stockholder in the Randolph Lumber company, of Aberdeen, Ore., and is spending a few days in the city on business and pleasure, after visiting friends up the river on New Year's.

Will Return in Auto—Albert A. Hanson, of Portland, who has been spending a few days in the city, will leave for home on the Breakwater tomorrow. He said this morning that he would return to visit this section next April and will endeavor to make the entire trip with his 40-horse power touring car.

Makes Record Trip—Local Agent Shaw, of the Alliance received word this morning that the Alliance had passed in over, the Columbia river bar at 5:30 a. m., making the trip from bar to bar in 18 hours and 30 minutes. She left over the Coos Bay bar at 11 o'clock yesterday morning and the trip is considered somewhat of a record.

New Year Starting Right—Since the commencement of the new year, Marshfield's population has shown a strong disposition toward hustle in the business section of the city. The same busy crowds that made the city lively before the momentary scarceness is apparent, and the indications are that business is going to be better than it ever was before, in 1908.

Starts In To Work Again—The North Bend Manufacturing company, the largest maker of sash and doors between "Frisco and Portland, has started up again in full blast after a temporary shut down during the holidays for a few repairs. This company has orders ahead which will take it months to complete, and arrangements have been made to install some extra machinery.

Mail Coming in Better—The mail from Roseburg during the past few days has been coming in almost on time. The letter mail was in right up to the date yesterday morning, while the paper mail was delayed about a day. The condition of the latter on its arrival would cause suspicion that it had been used for temporary improvements to the roadway, and it is probable that a great amount of circulars might be used to good advantage in this connection.

Will Ship Remains—The remains of Henry Martin, the unfortunate young man who came to a violent end through a fall at the C. A. Smith Lumber Company's mill, have been embalmed and will be shipped on the Breakwater to Portland and from that point east to Minneapolis by Manager Oren, pending the disposition of the boy's remains by the boy's father. A sad feature of the accident was the fact that Martin has received a letter with greetings for a happy new year on the morning of the accident.

Placing Machinery Orders—A. B. Daley, the mill machinery man, is enthusiastic over the situation among the mills in Coos County. He stated last night that in spite of the fact that he had not been pushing his business because of the pesty condition of affairs, he had placed a number of large orders for mill machinery with various firms in the county. Many of the older mills are preparing to put in new machinery with which to increase their output, and it is quite evident from the activity shown that the lumber business will be as good, or better, than it ever was on the coast.
