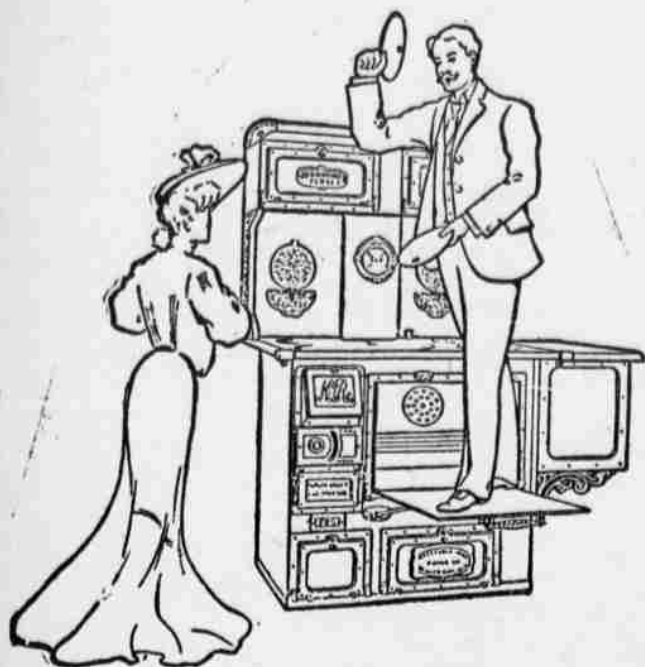

Brings Salt Salmon—The tug Roberts, of Florence, arrived in the harbor this morning from the Stuslaw river with about fifty barrels of the hold of the Breakwater just before she left for Portland.

Alliance Leaves on Sunday—Local Agent Shaw has received advices from Portland that the Alliance will leave that port for Coos Bay on Sunday evening, and that she will reach here on Tuesday morning, wind and weather permitting.

Millicoma's Steward—J. Goldie, late of Seattle, an experienced man, has been secured by the Millicoma Club as steward and will have charge of the commissary department of the new organization. Mr. Goldie is said to be an expert in the concoction of liquid delights and already has invented a new one that will be known as the Millicoma Morning Glory that will drive the cobwebs from the brain like the mist dissolving before a Coos Bay sunrise.

Receives New Whistle—The huge siren fire whistle ordered by the city council some months ago, arrived on the Breakwater yesterday morning consigned to the Pioneer Hardware company, of this city. The whistle has an eight-inch bell and will be one of the largest on the entire coast. It will require a three-inch steam pipe to supply the whistle in order that its resonant tones may be played to their utmost. It will be put in place on top of the electric lighting plant, which will furnish the steam for the fire warning. Judging from the appearance of the whistle, which is causing considerable interest, it will let the whole country know when there is a fire in Marshfield.

Falls Into The Bay—The story is told in the city that Dr. McCormac and his son were out shooting on Christmas Day on the lower part of the bay, when they saw a flock of "butterballs." In order to get within range, the doctor backed his launch on a mud flat, and it took several hours to get the craft off as the tide was running out. He pushed so hard that the pole suddenly snapped, allowing him to measure his length in the slough. It is said that he then waded around and finally pushed the craft into deep water. What happened afterward could not be learned.
