THE NAN SMITH BACK IN PORT

Returns to Newport News, Va., Because of Bad Leakage—Description of Boat.

According to a dispatch from Newport News, Va., the steamer Nan Smith, which left Baltimore on the 20th for Coos Bay, put back into the former port in a leaking condition. The report says that while the steamer is an oil burner she is using coal on her return and a large consignment for San Francisco, which was not for the use of the battleship fleet as was reported.

Speaking of the new steamer the Nautical Gazette of December 26, says:

The new steamer Nan Smith, launched in October at Newport News for the C. A. Smith Lumber Co., of St. Paul, Minn., has loaded 3,100 tons of coal at Port Covington, and started on her maiden voyage to San Francisco. She was built for the Pacific coast lumber trade and will be known there as a steam schooner. Her engines, boilers and officers quarters are located aft, and her cargo capacity, including deckload, is 2,225,000 feet of lumber.

The steamer is 283 feet long, 43 feet beam, and 21 feet depth of hold. She is driven by a single screw triple expansion engine capable of developing 1,350 horse power. Steam is furnished by two Scotch boilers fitted to burn oil as well as coal. In addition to the quarters provided for officers, a cabin is set apart for the

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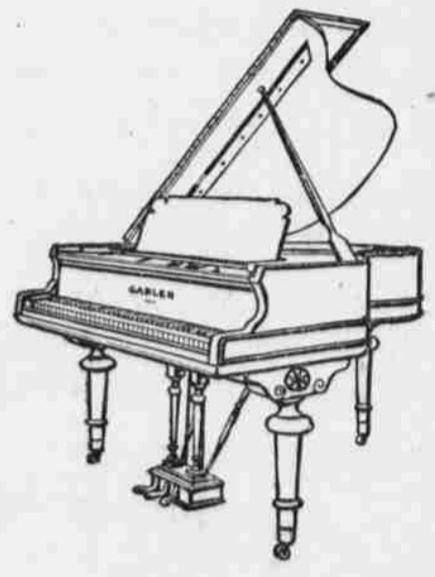
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
