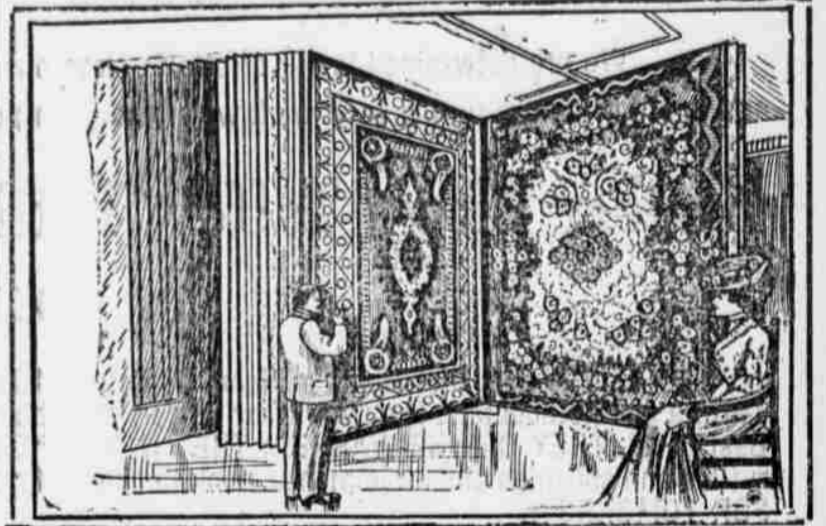

BIG SALES AT RETAIL YARD

Smith Company Sells Two
Hundred Thousand Feet
Since First of Year.

Since the first of the year the C. A. Smith Lumber company's retail yards in Marshfield have sold over two hundred thousand feet of lumber for buildings in the city, and at this rate the construction of residences and other buildings will break all records. Of this amount of lumber one hundred thousand feet will be used in the construction of about eight homes.

One hundred thousand feet of lumber will be used in the erection of the temple of the Knights of Finland, and besides these amounts there was also considerable lumber ordered before the first of the year which is not counted. These sales indicate that with a little fine weather building operations in Marshfield for the present month will be far ahead of the month of January of last year.

The highest temperature for the year occurred on the 4th day of October and the lowest on the 15th day of January. Only three times did the thermometer go above 80 degrees and 22 represents the total number of times it fell below 32 degrees. The mean temperature for the year is 52.9. The average mean temperature for the past five is 51.4 degrees. The last frost of the spring occurred on the 24th of April but did little damage; the first killing frost of latter part of the year occurred on the 3rd day of November. The total rain fall for the year is 78.73 inches; the average for the past five years is 67.53 inches. The greatest precipitation in 24 hours occurred on the 3rd day of January which was 4.03 inches. The month of January was characterized by a snow fall of 6.75 inches which is very unusual for this part of the state. There were 168 rainy days, 124 clear, 32 partly cloudy and 209 cloudy.
