### CAPT. MOLONEY MAKES NEW FRISCO RECORD

Master of Steam Schooner Fulton Makes Record Time 'Frisco To North Bend.

Captain Moloney, who is master of the Fulton, the lumber carrying steam schooner plying between North Bend and San Francisco, made a record smashing trip on the last voyage. Capt. Moloney is only in charge of the Fulton during a vacation of the regular captain, but when he passed out of the Golden Gate on his way northward last week he encountered a strong gale from the southeast, and spreading his canvas, succeeded with the aid of Old Boreas in covering the distance from San Francisco dock to the dock at the Porter mill in North Bend in exactly 48 hours. This is a record time for the Fulton and is almost equal to the time of the passenger steamer M. F. Plant. Capt. Moloney will probably make one more trip with the Fulton before the regular captain of the boat assumes command.
