New Potatoes in January.—Rev John Thomas, the Baptist minister, brought some new potatoes that he dug out of his garden on Wednesday of this week.—Coquille Sentinel.

New Life Saver.—Clarence Boice, No. 1 at the Bandon Life Saving station, will move to Empire city to take a similar position in the Coos Bay station. Mrs. Boice will accompany him and they will make their home at Empire.—Bandon Recorder.

Ill With Diphtheria.—Miss Gertrude Smith, cashier at the Melrose restaurant, who is visiting at her home in Portland, is reported ill with diphtheria. Many Marshfield friends will wish for her early recovery.

Council Meets Tonight.—The Marshfield city council will meet in regular session tonight to consider a number of important matters to come before it, and the board of equalization will also gather to consider street assessments for thoroughfares which are to be improved.

Condition Critical.—J. G. Hill, the North Bend man who last week attempted suicide, has changed very little since that time. At first he seemed somewhat improved, and expressed a desire to recover. At the present time he seems to have become much weaker, and at times semi-delirious. His condition is very serious.—Bandon Recorder.

Will Investigate Accident.—According to stories printed in Portland, Messrs. Edwards and Fuller, of that city will hold an investigation over the recent accident to the Breakwater at the Coos Bay bar, when a messboy was killed and one sailor severely injured, with several being bruised. The Breakwater left for Portland yesterday morning and upon her arrival at her destination the enquiry will be held.

Gas Machinery Arrives.—The machinery and gas tanks for the gas factory to be erected near the Porter mill in North Bend has arrived and is lying on the wharf near the sash and door factory. Active work on this structure has commenced and the citizens both of Marshfield and North Bend will soon be able to "cook with gas and light with electricity,"—when the power isn't off.

Will Resume Regular Run.—W. J. Maloney, who last summer superintended the construction of the steam schooner Bowdoin, is in Marshfield this week on the steamer Fulton, and will make another run in place of the captain who is ill in San Francisco. Mr. Maloney informs us that the Bowdoin, of which he will be captain, will in another month be completed, and ready to go upon her regular run.—Bandon Recorder.

Redondo is At North Bend.—The steam schooner Redondo, belonging to the Simpson interests, arrived at North Bend last Thursday and will leave for San Francisco on ETAOIN leave for San Pedro and way ports about next Wednesday. The steamer will take a big load of box material from the box factory at North Bend where she is now tied up, and a large number of railroad ties will compose her deck load, the latter going to the Santa Fe railroad at San Francisco.

Launch Parties Numerous.—Launch parties from North Bend and Marshfield have been numerous during the past two days, which have been exceptionally fine for this time of the year. Quite a large number of boats were out on the bay yesterday with their owners and crowds of friends. What is interesting to new arrivals from the east in this stunt is that the climate of this section enables launching in January, with the weather as fine as it is anywhere even in summer.

Scow Being Repaired.—The huge scow belonging to Masters & McLain, which sank with a load of stone up the Coos River several weeks ago, has been cleared of its load and was floated down to the harbor several days ago. The scow is being repaired on the mud flats below the Standard Oil warehouses and will be again in commission within a few days. The scarcity of stone at the local crushing plant of Masters & McLain has stimulated activity in putting the huge craft again in commission.

Wm. DEWAR, of Gardiner, father of Mrs. John Dolan, who was called here by Mr. Dolan's sudden death, will remain for some days visiting his daughter. Mrs. Dewar, mother of Mrs. Dolan is expected to arrive from Gardiner this evening.

G. L. DINDINGER has returned to Marshfield from an extended holiday visit in Portland. Contrary to reports that preceded him he returned alone but there are some evidences that these rumors are only a bit premature and that their foundation is something more substantial than mere fancy.

L. A. LOOMIS for some weeks in charge of the accounting department of The Times has departed to join his family in Los Angeles. During his stay on Coos Bay Mr. Loomis was very favorably impressed with the resources and prospects of this section and expects to return and make some investments and possibly engage in business here.

Leaves For Portland.—Secretary Lyon, of the chamber of commerce, left for Portland on the Drain stage this morning to attend to business matters in connection with the local boosting organization. While in Portland he will visit the firm which is going to build the machinery for the dredge, which is to be used by harbors on the coast, and as a result the woodwork of the structure may give this harbor a chance to get in on the ground floor on the dredging proposition which is greatly needed for shipping in the Marshfield end of the bay.

May Order More Pamphlets.—The chamber of commerce may order nearly double the number of pamphlets which it first intended to secure from Portland. It ordered 20,000 for the small sum of \$650, but the booklets are in such great demand from various sources that the original amount will not be nearly enough. Besides these the local chamber will use, the Southern Pacific desires to place about 15,000 in its eastern offices. The North Bend chamber of commerce is figuring on taking 10,000 for its own use, and local citizens are sending out thousands of them. Considering that 40,000 will cost only \$950 it is considered that this is mighty cheap advertising for Coos county, and the local chamber is figuring on doubling the first order. The booklets are very attractive and have attracted wide attention because of their beauty and the valuable matter they contain regarding the resources of this district.
