**TAXES FOR YEAR TO BE 13 MILLS**

County Court Fixes Levy One Mill Lower Than Last Year For Coos.

Judge Hall has returned from Coquille where he has been holding county court for the past week and states that the levy this year for the county and state taxes will be 13 mills, a reduction of one mill under last year.

Twenty-eight road supervisors were appointed last night and there will be some changes in Coos Bay, the district being extended up Isthmus Inlet. Bay City will be taken into Sumner district, and other changes have been made.

Bids for the ferry to be used between this city and East Marshfield will be let in March for a flat bottomed boat with side wheels, fifty feet long and twenty wide. The plans have been approved for the ferryboat.

To meet the county expenses for the year 1908 the total taxes to be raised will be \$175,094.42, of which a detailed account will be announced on Monday.

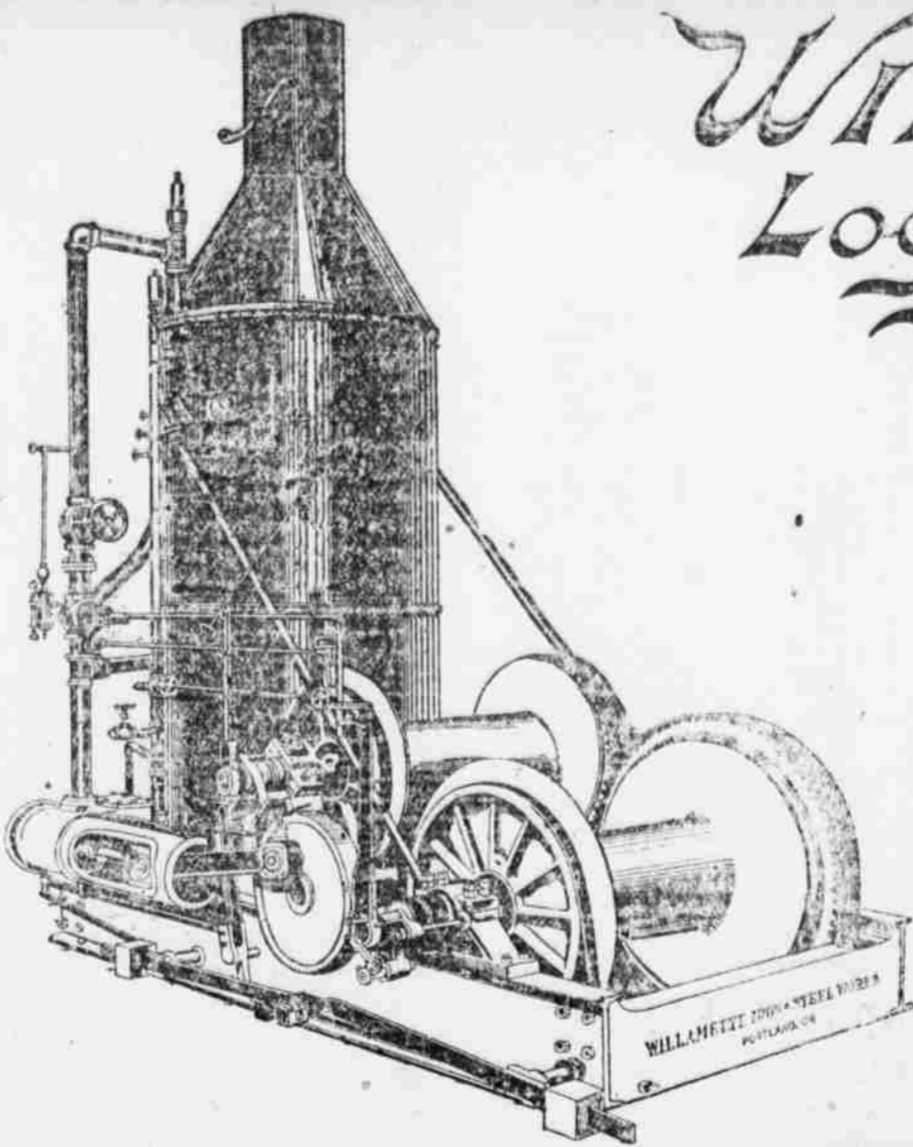

**NORTHERN PAC. MAY BE FIRST**

Local Engineer Believes Hill's Coast Line Will Beat Drain Railroad.

Sentiment on Coos Bay regarding railroad construction is to the effect that the Northern Pacific will be running trains into this city before the Southern Pacific road between this point and Drain is completed. This is the firm conviction of a number of men who claim to be on the inside regarding the work of surveyors who have been on the coast between this point and Seaside, at the end of the Northern Pacific road on the coast of Oregon.

"I know for a fact," said Engineer Charles Coddling, this morning, at the chamber of commerce, "that the Northern Pacific has had men in the field between Siuslaw and Tillamook for the past two summers. They have been going over the coast thoroughly looking for a good route for the extension of the road from Seaside down the coast to Siuslaw and to Coos Bay.

"The activity shown by the Northern Pacific on the Oregon coast is proof that the assertion recently made by J. S. Dellinger, of Astoria, that this company would continue its road along the coast, is correct. There is no doubt that when once the route has been secured the construction will follow rapidly because the Northern Pacific rushes matters when once it starts doing things.

"Meanwhile, the Southern Pacific is attempting to corral the trade between this port and Portland by putting on extra boats and with considerable success. The Czarlina is to be put on the run with the Breakwater so as to secure all the freight possible and to hold the field for this railway extension to be completed from Drain to Coos Bay."

**TO COIN NO MORE NEW TWENTIES.**

St. Gaudens' Design Abandoned—No Return of In God We Trust.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—A Washington special to a New York paper says the last of the St. Gaudens \$20 pieces has been struck off. Mint Director Leach said: "We had to change the die after the first 8000 were struck off. It was found that the high, rough edge was too subject to abrasion, so we milled the edge. Then complaints came in that the figure of Liberty was so high that the coins would not stack, so we changed the die again.

"Then some one said that if we continued to designate the dates by Roman numerals there would not be room for them after awhile. On that we again changed the die and put in Arabic numerals. That left St. Gaudens' design a whole lot disfigured. He had decided to abandon the old die entirely, but demands for the original coin became so numerous we let it work for a time, but no more St. Gaudens' coins will be minted.

"In God We Trust" will not appear on coins to be minted hereafter.

**ANOTHER SON IS MISSING**

Fifth Inquiry Made for Lost Man in Less Than Six Weeks.

Numerous enquiries are being made for sons in this section and hardly a week goes by that some mother does not send to Coos Bay in search of a son who was last heard of in this place. The latest is an enquiry from Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Campbell, of Norden, Neb., who have not heard from their son Arthur D. Campbell since last September, when he was working at a local lumber camp. The letter was received by Rev. W. R. F. Browne, of the Methodist Episcopal church: Norden, Neb., Dec. 31, 1907.

"Dear Bro.—We have a son away from home. He wrote us from your city about Sept. 1st, and we answered the letter about the last of September, and the letter was returned to us uncalled for. He said he was working in the timber. We are very anxious about him. We thought perhaps if anything happened to him you might know it. He will be 23 years old next February if he lives. His name is Arthur D. Campbell. Kindly enquiry every place you think it would be possible to get a clue as to where he is. We would be glad to pay any expense that is incurred. We remain

This makes at least five enquiries for lost persons in this county within the past six weeks, and there appears to be something radically wrong somewhere. If the same number were missing from every spot in the United States in the same length of time, nearly every citizen of the union would be lost inside of a year.

It is thought that most of the men missing at this point have written to their parents, but owing to the condition of the mail service the answers have been delayed or lost altogether. Another feature of the missing sons is that in nearly every case they were last heard of as working in the logging camps, and in that case they do not have writing desks provided for their use, and it may be that they became slack in their correspondence.

Walter Lyon, secretary of the Marshfield chamber of commerce, was in Myrtle Point Tuesday interviewing fruit growers and others in the interests of organizing and the appointment of a fruit inspector. **ELECTRIC POWER FROM THE MIDDLE FORK. HAS FIRST CHILD IN BOOM TOWN.**

Development of Energy From Coos County River Being Investigated.

E. V. Hawley, a grandson of Orville Dodge of this city, is here on a visit and to look up the possibilities for electrical development in this section. Mr. Hawley is principal of the electrical engineering department of the agricultural college at Corvallis. He has begun investigating the possibility of developing electric energy from the Middle Fork at a point about six miles south of Myrtle Point and is confident that there is sufficient power going to waste there which, if put to use, would be a great factor in the development of the valley. He has been interviewing the business men and property owners to see what encouragement would be given to such an undertaking and has met with gratifying success here. On Tuesday he left for the Coquille and the lower river to interview the people and if he finds sufficient encouragement will return in the spring and further develop the project. He also intends to interview the people on the Bay for the same purpose. He is confident that there is power to light the various towns of Coos county, furnish power for the various industries and generate a current for an electric line. A flume to carry the water from one level to another would be the method of generating the power.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

**CIGARETTES COST JOB; SUES**

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 10.—Whether or not a man who is under contract for a year's work may be summarily discharged for breaking the rule that there must be no cigarette smoking on the premises of his employers, is the problem which confronts Judge Reid. The issue is presented in the suit of Herman Nagle against the Griffin Wheel company. Nagle disregarded a sign, "Cigarette smoking strictly prohibited," and although he has a contract, for a year's work at \$3.75 a day, he was discharged. He is now suing to recover \$650.

**Resident of Seattle Suburb Now Wants Agent to Pay Prize.**

SEATTLE, Jan. 10.—Several months ago C. D. Hillman, a real estate dealer, advertised that he would give \$500 to the parents of the first child born in a new city he has placed on the market. Believing the dealer would keep his promise, especially as it was made personally after inquiry, H. D. Younkman, who recently came to Seattle from the east, bought a lot in the new town and went there to live in a house he built. Three weeks ago a baby girl was born at the Younkman household, and as soon as the consequent excitement had subsided the happy father went to the real estate man and put in his claim to the \$500.

Hillman made some excuse, and after waiting awhile the father went again with his demand, but the real estate man declared that there was a conspiracy, and that Younkman at the time he bought the lot had received private advices from the stork, and that, therefore, the deal was off. Younkman declares that he will sue the real estate man, and has employed a lawyer for that purpose.

**WOULD MAKE MOTHER EVE'S MOUTH WATER**

Myrtle Point Man Has an Apple That Weighs 24 Ounces.

Albert Myers, of Norway, brought in some mammoth Oregon Winter King apples on New Year's day that show something of what can be done with fruit here. One of the specimens weighed 24 ounces and measured 14 inches in circumference. They have 15 or 20 bushels of the fruit, all of great size, and they are said to be fine for cooking, for eating, or for keeping. The trees were propagated in the nursery of Jos.
