**Will Install Power Plant.**—W. A. Brown, an electrical expert of Columbus, Ohio, arrived in the city today on the Breakwater to install an electric power plant at the Beaver Hill mine, which will be used for electric pumps which are being placed in the mine.

**Bound Over to Grand Jury.**—Roy Raven, of North Bend, charged with stealing \$82 from Otto Stevens some days ago at a point across the bay, was given a preliminary hearing before the justice in North Bend yesterday and was bound over to the grand jury on this serious charge.

**Steelheads Are Plentiful.**—Salmon of the steelhead variety have been quite plentiful on Coos Bay for the past week or more and the fishermen are making good catches. Quite a number of fish are being shipped to Portland to market by the steamers running out to that city.

Dally, Marshfield's favorite comedian, has his name at the head of the program of Roseburg's Vitagraph, a moving picture show which has been taken over by Roy Bellows, Arrie Black and Grace Moore. **Seeks Information.**—Deputy Game Warden Cal. W. Wright announces that the practice of running deer with dogs in this district will be stopped if it is possible. He has offered to give any person part of the fine for information against persons running deer with dogs or shooting them out of season. The fine is from \$50 to \$200. The fine for shooting any kind of bird or animal whatever without a license is from \$25 to \$100 with imprisonment. He announces that the duck shooting season will close at the end of this month, and that any person found hunting without a license at any time will be arrested and fined.

**Brings Chemical Engine.**—H. B. Watson, proprietor of the Seattle Brass company, arrived in the city today on the Breakwater with the new chemical engine to be used by the local fire department, and which was ordered by the city council some months ago. The engine is a double cylinder chemical engine of the most modern type, each cylinder being of 35 gallons capacity. One is filled while the other is being exhausted and in this manner the machine can do an immense amount of work. Three gallons of the mixture used to extinguish fires is equal to 2800 gallons of water in putting out a fire and the machine will be a valuable acquisition to the fire fighting paraphernalia of Marshfield. With 100 feet of hose the machine cost the city \$770. It is probable that Mr. Watson will give an illustration of how the apparatus works before returning to Seattle.
