## NEED ATTENTION

Never, in the life of Coos Bay, did the prospects look so brilliant as they do at the present moment and never have the inhabitants of the cities been more hopeful. Even those men and women who have been disposed to murmur at the long wait of past years are developing a spirit very much like that which has made Seattle famous. Whether a city becomes great and takes rank as such depends first on her people and their capacity to act in concert and next and always afterwards on their keeness and energy in pushing forward their claims without cessation. Marshfield and North Bend, although for some petty reason separated politically, have one common purpose and one common destiny. Together they must work out every problem which affects Coos Bay and sooner or later, when Empire gets into the light, the three must work unitedly.

The present is a most important moment for this locality. The time for united and persistent action in a very great cause has come. Great and inspiring news has reached the bay which leads to the conclusion that if the cities of Coos Bay choose they may have their harbor dredged and their ocean bar at the mouth of the bay reduced. But however inspiring the news, the people who live in the bay cities, should understand that they must be up and doing in order to take advantage of an opportunity which, however promising, may slip away. Nobody is so much interested in Coos Bay as its own people. Nobody cares a penny whether Coos Bay becomes a great harbor except the people of Coos Bay. Some people elsewhere would rather the bay remain unimproved. In a general way congress is ready or reluctant to develop some new harbors and one on the Pacific coast, but most of the information which the developments, congress and the congressional committees have, is filed away in alcoves and is made use of only when a question arises. Then a clerk looks up the files and the honorable gentleman from Massachusetts or Colorado is surprised at the facts which the Marshfield or North Bend man has called his attention to.

Coos Bay never needed a man in Washington as badly as she does now. Senator Fulton or Senator Bourne or Representative Hawley will do what they can, but they have other matters also to attend to. The chambers of commerce of North Bend and Marshfield should each make arrangements to have a man or if possible, several men go down to Washington at the right time. When a bill which is interesting to Coos Bay is set for consideration by the committee to which it is referred, either of the senators or representative Hawley will, if requested, wire the secretaries of the two chambers and the Coos Bay men should then proceed to the capital. This is the manner in which all communities important enough to demand legislation impress their claims.
