Alliance Sails.—The Alliance sailed from Portland at 4 o'clock and is due in Coos Bay tomorrow morning some time before noon.

Plant Coming.—The Plant left San Francisco last night about 4 o'clock and is due in this port about 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Dividend Declared.—The East Marshfield Land company declared its second monthly dividend yesterday, the share holders receiving 12 per cent. The first dividend, declared last month, was for 10 per cent.

The New Tax Law.—The Roseburg News recently contained the opinion of District Attorney Brown regarding the new tax law, of which the following is the summary: "Taxes will become delinquent the first Monday in April. If the full amount is paid on or before March 15th, a rebate of three per cent will be allowed. If one-half of the above taxes is paid on or before the first Monday in April, the time for the remaining half will be extended to the first Monday in October; if not so paid and becomes delinquent, a penalty of 10 per cent and 12 per cent increase will be added."

Horticulture at Flagstaff.—One of the best projects which Coos Bay has enjoyed for some time is now being installed in the way of a horticulture establishment up Isthmus Inlet. C. Kundson, recently from Hood River, has purchased property in Flagstaff and is now engaged in building a green house. It is his intention to raise flowers of all kinds and eventually to build more hot houses and go into the green stuffs market if the demand is sufficiently large. He will also embark in the general nursery business. Flagstaff is peculiarly adapted to the needs of Mr. Kundson's business. It is well known that the different sections of Coos Bay have individual climatic conditions, the degree of severe or mild weather depending on the protection of the hills and the distance from the ocean. Flagstaff is situated some distance up Isthmus Inlet and lays on a sort of plateau which is protected on the north, west and south sides by the hills, thus affording it protection from the ocean winds and at the same time allowing it its full quantum of sunshine.

FOR PAVING FRONT STREET

Property Owners Taking Active Steps For Important Improvement.

Front street property owners generally are beginning to realize the pressing need of a substantial pavement on the city's main business thoroughfare. In fact it may be stated that the paving question has gone past the realization period. So strong has the sentiment in favor of paving become that it has crystallized into a movement and now several of the more progressive property holders have pledged themselves to stand the expense of laying pavement in front of their properties. The pavement described in the Times of recent date is looked upon with the most favor by the property owners. There are two reasons for this. First its wearing qualities; second, the fact that the entire pavement can be laid without going outside the local market. This pavement consists first of a 5 to 7 inch layer of concrete. Portland has a six inch layer on her streets. A sand cushion, one inch deep, rests upon the concrete on which is placed wooden blocks 4x8x 4 1/2 inches high. After the blocks are laid they are treated with a coating of boiling asphaltum which not only makes the pavement waterproof but allows for expansion and contraction as well. Masters & McLain estimate that this pavement can be laid complete with curbs and catch basins for 35c a square foot or about \$7 a lineal foot. Appended is the body of the Eddy act which is conceded to be one of the best measures ever enacted for the purposes of raising funds for property improvements. The long time payments which it allows on work of this character, ten annual installments, and the thorough manner in which it protects the property owner have placed it in high favor in the cities of Oregon where it has been adopted.

The Eddy Act.

Whenever in any incorporated city or town within this state the common council, board of trustees, or other competent authority of such city or town, shall have proceeded to improve any street or part of street, or to lay any sewer within the corporate limits thereof and shall have assessed the costs of such improvement or sewer to the property benefited thereby, or liable therefor, according to the provisions of the charter of such city or town, it shall be lawful for the owner of any property so assessed for such improvement or sewer in the sum of twenty-five dollars or more, at any time within ten days after notice of such assessment is first published, to file with the auditor, clerk, or other city or town officers, who, by the provisions of the charter thereof, keeps the record of such city or town, a written application to pay said assessment in installments, and such written application shall state that the said applicant and property owner does thereby waive all irregularities or defects, jurisdictional or otherwise, in the proceedings to improve the street or lay the sewer for which said assessment is levied and in the apportionment of the costs thereof. Said application shall contain a provision that the said applicant and property owner agrees to pay said assessment in ten annual installments, with interest at the same rate on all of said assessments, which have not been paid, as that expressed in the bond issued to pay for such improvements. Said application shall also contain a statement, by lots or blocks, or other convenient description, of the property of the applicant assessed for such improvement or sewer. No application as aforesaid, shall be received and filed by the auditor, clerk, or other officer, if the amount of such assessment with any previous assessments for street improvements or sewers, assessed against the same property and remaining unpaid, shall equal or exceed the valuation of said property, as shown by the last tax roll of the county in which situated. The majority of the owners of the property so assessed shall select a competent person to inspect such improvement under the direction of the city engineer of such city; provided that application for such bonding shall be received by the auditor, clerk, or other officer in cases where the amount of the assessment, together with previous assessments for street improvements or sewers against the property (and remaining unpaid), shall exceed the valuation of said property as shown by the last tax roll of the county, or the owner shall before making such application pay in cash into the treasury of the city or town such excess of unpaid assessments over the valuation as shown by such last tax roll.
