Strange Freaks of News from Many Quarters.

Rooster Puts Man to Flight.
Attempting to take a hen from his poultry yard at Red Lion, near York, Pa., Edward Wagman was attacked by a highly prized Indian Cornish game cock, which badly gashed his hand. As he dropped the hen to meet the cock's furious charge, one of its spurs struck him, ripping a deep wound and severing an artery. The hen was the chief favorite of the lord of the yard.

Truly a Leap Year Bride.
That leap year offers opportunities not to be missed by the girls, especially those of the eastern shore of Maryland, was demonstrated recently when Miss Mary E. Titter, of Chesapeake City walked into the office of Magistrate Robertson and asked for a marriage license. Her husband to be, Enos Bockworth, stood outside and was joined by the girl when she secured the papers. Later the couple were married.

Spends His Winters in Bed.
Going to bed with the advent of rigorous weather late in the fall and remaining there until the temperature moderates in the spring has been the voluntary and peculiar practice of Peter O'Connor, an old resident of Flint, Mich., for the last 30 years.

O'Connor is 87 years old and makes his home with a nephew. He has a pronounced aversion of cold weather, and at present is observing his usual custom of spending the winter ensconced in blankets on a cot located within a few feet of a stove within which a fire is constantly kept burning. He is in no sense an invalid, but, on the contrary, has an unusual capacity for work, for a man of his years, and puts in a good deal of his time making himself useful.

Wills Body to His Friends.
Believing he has solved the problem of being useful though dead, Henry E. Sullivan, a prominent member of the Nameoki club, New York, has willed himself, body and bones, for the manufacture of articles for his friends. The instrument directs that the executors are to circulate buttons, one half inch to one inch in diameter, made out of his bones; to have his skin tanned and made into pouches; to have made out of such parts of his body as may be suitable, strings for the violin, such as are usually designated "cat gut" strings. The buttons, violin strings and tanned skin are bequeathed to James Hayes, a clubmate, who is directed to distribute them according to his discretion among Sullivan's intimate friends.

Egg and Sausage Duel.
On the night of January 19, at Bucyrus, Ohio, a row at the Sulphur Springs M. E. church fair resulted in destroying a 14-foot sausage and a half-pound egg, two curiosities which were on exhibition there. The sausage was broken over the head of Oscar Johnson and the egg, which was declared to be the biggest in the state, was smashed on the manly chest of Joseph Moulton.

The fight at the fair caused great excitement in the little village, and it is hinted that an echo of the affair will be heard in Justice Patton's Court tomorrow.

W. A. Walker contributed the mammoth sausage to the collection of curiosities at the fair. The meat product measured 14 feet 6 inches in length, 4 inches in circumference and weighed 9 pounds. Henry Sproed added the monster egg to the exhibition. Jamison and Moulton quarreled with two other men over some of the prizes awarded, and in the scrap that followed the long sausage was welded by one of the men, while the other mopped up the combatants with the egg. The fighters got tangled up in the sausage and the fight stopped.
