**Breaks Three Ribs in Fall on Boat**

However, after donning the suit Steve and the rest of his friends carried out the evening’s program and report a pleasant evening at the North Bend Commercial club.

**Broke Three Ribs in Fall.**  
M. A. Sweetman, the Marshfield real estate man, suffered the fracture of three ribs last night. In stepping off his boat at his home he accidentally slipped striking some obstacle with his foot and fell back in the boat in such a manner that the ribs were broken. The fractures, while not serious, are very painful and will confine him to his home for some time. Dr. Houseworth was called and attended the injured man.

**Meets Painful Accident.**  
Charles Russell, a workman employed on the new dock being built at the Smith mill met with a slight but painful accident yesterday afternoon, while working on the end of a loose plank which was steadied by a workman on the other end also at work; the laborer at the opposite end stepped off and the plank teetered throwing Mr. Russell eight feet into the waters of the bay. Beneath the surface of the waters his jaw struck some obstruction inflicting a painful but not dangerous injury. Mr. Russell, who will be laid up for some time denies that he is in training to meet Petersen, but says if that pugilist can land on the jaw a blow like he received he would be sorry for the other fellow. Dr. Dix was called and dressed the injury and a rapid recovery is hoped for.

## NEW BOAT BETWEEN EUREKA AND COOS BAY

Traveling Man Reports That Regular Line of Communication Between Coast Cities Will Be Established.

W. W. Case, traveling representative of the wholesale paper house of Bonestell, Richardson & Co., of San Francisco, is in Marshfield today making his first trip in the Coos Bay country in the interests of his company. Mr. Case made the trip to Coos Bay by way of the round-about route of Eureka and Astoria. The only method of reaching here from Eureka being to return to San Francisco or as he made it going to Astoria and returning on the Alliance. While in Eureka Mr. Case learned that the new steamer which is to make stops at Eureka and Coos Bay will be put on the regular run sometime within the next few weeks. He stated that the people of Eureka were anxiously awaiting this closer line of commercial connection with Coos Bay and a good business for the new steamer is expected from the start.

Mr. Case is being piloted on his initial trip by A. R. Olsson, (with two letter S, if you please, Mr. Linotyper,) a fellow angel of commerce who represents the Diamond Rubber Co., of Akron, Ohio. Mr. Olsson handles all kinds of rubber except the kind that goes into rubber necks. Both travelers are more than favorably impressed with the Coos Bay cities which will be made regularly hereafter.
