May Realize Fortune.—Levi Smith, of Marshfield leaves tomorrow morning on the Breakwater. He has received a flattering offer for an undercutting device he lately patented and likely will dispose of the invention before he returns to Coos Bay. The amount he has been tendered for the invention is a comfortable fortune.

Acme Band Dance.—The Acme Band dance tomorrow night in the I. O. O. F. hall, Marshfield, is already assured of good patronage. Those who attend the annual affair of this musical organization always anticipate the excellent quality of music furnished for the dances. Tomorrow night the members will appear in full dress uniform.

Distributing Game Laws.—Cal Wright, game warden of Coos county, is now distributing a number of books on the game laws, throughout his territory. The game warden caught two offenders in Ten Mile about two weeks ago. They were hunting ducks without a hunter's license. When arrested they had six dead web-footers in their game bags.

Condon vs. Straw on the Mail.—Hand shakes and congratulations were the order in Marshfield, and doubtless North Bend also, yesterday. For the second time in many moons the mail arrived on time. That is it got here early in the morning. "Doc" Straw said it was yesterday's mail a day late. This pessimistic view was not taken, however, by Ivy Condon who said he had known the mail to arrive a day ahead of time. Asked for an example he cited the case of a man who sent him a bill dated the 1st on the 31st of the month.

Make Valuable Find.—Captain Dave Golden, of the launch Gasco, and Chief Nichols, of the Marshfield fire department returned yesterday from a trip to Gardiner. On their homeward journey they picked up 400 pounds of whalebone on the beach between Jarvis landing and Ten Mile creek. As the bone was too heavy for the stage horses to pull through the sand Messrs. Nichols and Golden walked to the Jarvis landing with it. Chief Nicol's share of the bone is 200 pounds. The last market quotations he had give it a value of \$4 a pound. This will net the chief \$800. He says he intends to devote the entire sum to the rehabilitation of the Marshfield Fire Department, his first move being to secure quarters for the firemen.

Judge Upton Hears Case.—Before Judge Upton, yesterday afternoon, a case of gambling, the defendants being Perry and Flanagan, of the Blanco hotel, was heard. A Mr. Waltermeyer, of Coquille, was responsible for the charge lodged against the defendants by Marsha Carter. (The evidence developed, however, that Waltermeyer did not have any case. Previous to lodging his complaint with Marshal Carter in which he stated that he had a \$100, he had been drinking heavily, and yesterday afternoon, to all appearances, he had not yet taken passage on the water wagon. The \$100 which he claimed to have lost was returned to him yesterday. It seem that he gave it to a man to keep for him and the latter intended to save it until he should sober up. In view of the trial, however he returned it to Waltermeyer. Judge Upton dismissed the case. Attorney McKnight appeared for the defendants and Attorney E. L. C. Farri for the prosecution.
