#### THE NEED AND DEMAND FOR FRANK, SQUARE MEN.

In his statement of the future published in the Times the editor recommended from referring to politics. The editor of the Times is a Roosevelt Republican. He is now and always has been a Republican, because he believes that the principles of that party are more nearly in accord with the best interests of the United States government. The words Roosevelt Republican are used as being more expressive of the progressive ideas and advanced ideals of the party of his choice. The Times has not now and will not in the future have any quarrel with the men who differ with it in politics. It recognizes the right of every man to the exercise of his own free will in determining his political course as freely and broadly as it does his right to choose his own friends and attend the church of his choice. In his discussion of county, state and national politics, the problems involved at all times are viewed from the broad platform of the general public good. The Times believes it speaks for the large majority of the members of the Republican party of Coos Co. when it demands of the candidates that they measure up to the required proportions and reach the standard of the following conditions:  
First, that they be honest.  
Second, that they be competent.  
Third, that they be clean and square.  
Fourth, that they be absolutely free and apart from any faction in or out of the party as representing such faction instead of the party and the people.  
Fifth, that their record shall be above suspicion.  
Sixth, that they shall be tireless and faithful in the enforcement of the laws.  
Seventh, that they are the Servants of the people and not the Masters.  
Eighth, that they will know neither friend nor foe in the discharge of their sworn official duties.  
The Times believes that adherence to these few, simple rules is not only good Republican doctrine but equally applicable to any other party. It will result in placing the very best men in nomination for the different offices.  
The Times will not in its editorial columns favor any candidate in preference to another prior to the primary election. Its news columns are open alike to all for the presentation of their respective merits without prejudice or preference.

#### ENDORSEMENT OF THE TIMES

The Times acknowledges and accepts the compliment paid it in the commendation of the Socialist Party of Coos county in convention assembled in Coquille, in the same spirit in which it was tendered.
