Seven candidates are already in the field for the office of sheriff of Curry county.

Senator Bourne has issued a circular letter addressed to the republican voters of Oregon to support the primary election law, and statement No. 1. He says: 'I advise my friends and constituents in the interest of true republicanism and ideal American citizenship to vote for statement No. 1 nominees for the legislature in the April primaries and vote only for statement No. 1 nominees at the June election and their party nominee for senator.'

George R. Shepherd, of Portland, has entered the race for congressman of the second congressional district. He was a nominee for congressman at the last election.

POINTER FOR BANDON

Here's a pointer for R. E. L. Beillon, the rustling manager of the woolen mills in Bandon: Statistics show that a large trade in blankets and rugs is opening up in China which is constantly increasing, and should serve as an outlet for American-made goods. The class of blankets which are most popular throughout Shantung, and north China generally, is a light weight cotton blanket which is being imported principally from Japan. Shanghai is the largest market for cotton blankets, where 275, 705 pieces were imported in 1906. Newchang followed with 246,219, while Shantung province (through the ports of Tsingtau and Chefoo), consumed 128,899. The blanket trade of China is valued at 1,192,213 haiwan taels, in which the United States has practically no share, and this notwithstanding the fact that much of the wool and cotton with which these goods are manufactured originates in the United States.
