New Launch About Ready.—The launch which Carl Kaufman is having built at the Max Timmerman boat building yards is rapidly nearing its launching. It is expected that it will be in readiness to turn over to the owner in about a week. The boat will have installed an eight horse power Hasse engine.

Homer Coming.—A telegram received from San Francisco yesterday stated that the steamer Homer left that port Wednesday afternoon about 4:30 o'clock. With favorable weather conditions the boat should arrive in Coos Bay some time Friday.

Columbia Due Sunday.—The tug Columbia is expected to arrive on Coos Bay Sunday. The tug has in tow the sailing schooner Omega which has been in dry dock in San Francisco. Engineer Ed Hansen, whose wife died Wednesday night at her home in Empire, about 9 o'clock, is on the tug and the date of the funeral services will be postponed pending his return.

School Board Meets.—A special meeting of the school board was held last night in Dr. J. T.
