Semi-Weekly Change of Bill Last Night Occasion for Large Out-Turning of Coos Bay People.

The illustrated songs were enjoyed thoroughly. One which was very warmly received last night was “Lovin' Time.” The colored pictures in this song deal with the courtship of a colored Romeo and his dusky Juliet, minus the sad ending which the original twain suffered. Summing it all up, the moving picture show which is now being put on at the Crystal merits support, and it is certain to have a continuation of its present success if the high standard now followed is kept up.
