#### LIBRARY MEETING.

The Chamber of Commerce has decided to take up the discussion of the Free public library for Marshfield next Friday evening the meeting of that body will be devoted to the subject. The movement for a public library has taken strong hold on all the people and it is probable that the friends of this proposed addition to intellectual Marshfield will fill the rooms of the Chamber of Commerce and that many good speeches will be made. The School Board also have caught the spirit and the suggestion has been offered that a portion of the site for the new school at South Marshfield be dedicated to the use of the library.

The prospects for a library are very gratifying. Probably the location should be central, but the location is not really not so important as the realization of the institution itself. It is a fact that Marshfield is singularly lacking in books and that it is not easy to find material from local references even for the proper illustration or explanation of things which need to be understood at home. If one doesn't have to go more than half a mile or so from the center of the city to get books, he or she should deem himself or herself fortunate. The main thing is to have the library available. The building itself will add to the strength of its location as a settled center from which values will never fade. The books will add to the orderly and intelligent development of the city and its successful life. If the people could be assured of a library through their own personal contributions it would be a very creditable thing for them to establish it themselves, but there is so much to be done in improving streets and building the foundation of a city that, at the present time and for many years to come, the chances are a library in its proper housing, will require the aid of some large outside fund. It seems to be a Carnegie library or none."

We cannot afford to let our children be without a library. We could have better public and school instruction, if a good library were available. Teachers, professional men and all classes would find their labors lightened instead of being often compelled to grope in the dark for want of the light which books afford. The Chamber of Commerce meeting should be filled to overflowing. It is not to be a meeting for the collection of money, but only to interest the people and to enable the Chamber to aid with the strength and wisdom which it has shown an unusual aptitude in bringing to all public matters which it has chosen to consider.

## OFFER SITE FOR LIBRARY

### Public School Directors Show Liberal Spirit—The New School.

Assurance is given that the school directors will donate gratis a site for the erection of the proposed Marshfield public library on the northeast corner of the plot of four acres which will be purchased from the I. O. O. F. cemetery association for the new Marshfield public school. This liberal action should result in the immediate co-operation of the citizens of Marshfield toward the raising of the desired \$3,000 library fund. The new public school grounds about the cemetery on the north. The land is practically cleared except for some stumps. It is the intention to build the sixteen room school building in the center of the plot; the center, when graded, will be the highest part of the plot, the ground sloping from it at a slight percentage to the boundaries. If some public-minded citizen will make the donation it is the intention to erect in the northwest corner a combined gymnasium and assembly hall, to be named after the donor.

While the school spirit, so essential to the success of an educational institution, is not lacking in the Marshfield school, it is obvious that the erection of a building such as is proposed, should foster a much keener sense of patriotism and school ardor than now exists. It would effect an equalization of recreation and study, and this balance of variety being struck the pupil would become imbued with added ambition and zest for work.

Dr. J. T. McCormac will leave shortly for an extended trip up the coast, where he will make a study of the school buildings in the different cities with a view to incorporating in the new Marshfield school the latest and best in school construction. Immediately after the bond election, on Saturday, March 14, at which the people of Marshfield will vote on the matter of bonding the city for \$50,000, plans and specifications will be called for, for the new school building.

### STEAMSHIP COMPANY LOSES SALVAGE CASE

Pettyjohn and Nichols Get Decision Against the Oregon Coal and Navigation Company.

The Case of Pettyjohn and Nichols against the Oregon Coal and Navigation company, involving salvage because of the recent accident to the steamer Plant, and which has been on trial for several days in Justice Pennoek's court, was this morning decided in favor of the plaintiffs. The contention of the plaintiffs was that the defendants acted contrary to the marine law covering vessels with a salvage cargo in unloading the goods consigned to them. The case has been appealed to the circuit court. George Watkins appeared for the plaintiffs and Clarke, Blake and Liljeqvist for the defendants.

### CHILDREN START ON CRIMINAL CAREER

Three Brothers and a Sister Are Accused of Breaking Into and Robbing a Bandon Store.

Complaints have been made before Judge Hall against four children of the Hollenbeck family, at Bandon, for forcing entrance into a combination store and dwelling in that city. Hubert Hollenbeck, S. Ora Hollenbeck, Tollis D. Hollenbeck and Flo Hollenbeck (girl) are accused of the crime. It is charged that they extracted several articles of clothing. Their hearing has been set for next week before Judge Hall. If the evidence is sufficient they will be sent to one of the children's homes in Portland. All of them are minors. They have resided in Bandon but a short time. The mother is dead. The children live with their father.
