A recent Washington dispatch says President Roosevelt was over-riden by the House Committee on Coinage, Weights and Measures, when by unanimous vote it was agreed to report favorably the bill presented by McKinley of Illinois requiring the restoration on gold and silver coins of the national motto, "In God We Trust."

During the discussion Representative Knowland of California, in a facetious mood, moved that the committee further recommend the placing upon all clearing house certificates the Biblical inscription, "I Know That My Redeemer Liveth."

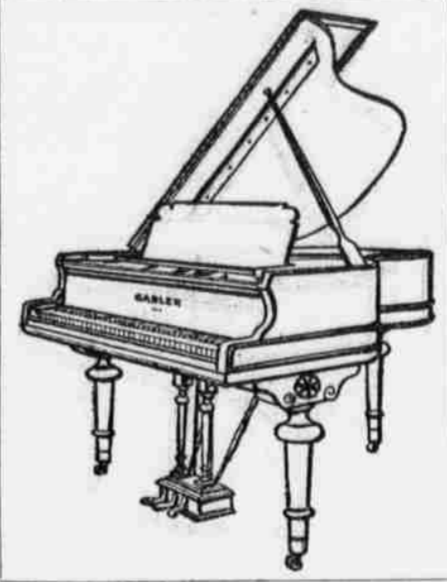
