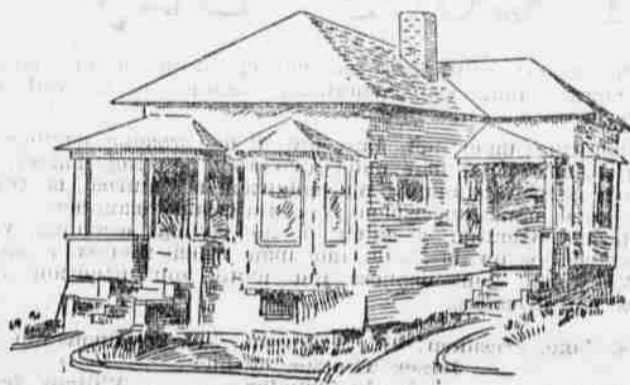

Baseball Spirit Awakens.—The ideal weather which Coos Bay has been enjoying previous to the recent rains has warmed the baseball spirit into life, after its long winter sleep. In North Bend the manifestations are especially marked; in fact baseball prognostications are taking precedence over the coming presidential nominations. The North Bend lineup is now about completed, theoretically, and the fans are making strong claims for a pennant-winning bunch.

Coos Bay's treasure trove of green was called into requisition, and every nook and corner in the hall was hidden in a mantle of springtime. The symbol of the club, "500," was worked out in evergreens on different portions of the walls. The Langenberg orchestra, by its faultless rendition of the different dance numbers, played its way into the hearts of all who attended. It is the intention to give another dance in the near future.

J. F. Bode Is Pleased.—Manager J. F. Bode, of the North Bend Sash and Door Factory, along with hundreds of other millmen, is extremely well pleased with the recent action of the railroads in reducing the rate on doors and sashes to the east to the old rate. Mr. Bode states that the reduction will effect a saving of \$2,000 a year to the local factory. It will also aid materially in lightening the effects of the late financial stringency on the coast by opening up hundreds of factories, forced to suspend by reason of the prohibitive shipping rates to the great eastern markets. The old rate, which has again been put into effect by the railroads, is ten per cent lower than the one which it supersedes.

Evergreen Whist Club Entertains.—A delightful evening was spent at the home of Mr. and Mrs. F. P. Norton Saturday evening, by the husbands and ladies of the Evergreen Whist Club, the occasion being the last Saturday prior to the Lenten season. A delightful program of graphophone music contributed materially toward the evening's pleasure. Toward the close the guests were served to delicious luncheon. James Rolandson and Mrs. W. C. Bradley won gentlemen's and ladies' first prizes respectively, and W. P. Murphy and Mrs. M. A. Matson the consolation prizes. The interior of Mr. and Mrs. Norton's home was tastefully decorated with flowers and huckleberry vines, presenting a beautiful appearance.

Dainty John Quills, myrtle, and rosebuds compose this most effective tribute to the perennial mildness of Coos county's climate.

The Drain Road.—New steel bridge material continues to arrive almost daily for the Drain-Coos Bay railroad, and several acres in South Drain are now covered with it. There is material here already for twenty bridges. Forty-nine carloads of it have arrived for the big bridge across Elk Creek at Elkton.—Drain Non-pariel.
