Sails For San Francisco.—The large barkentine Arago is loaded and will sail for San Francisco today from North Bend.

Berwick Arrives.—The gasoline schooner Berwick has arrived in the bay. The boat will be here for some time undergoing some light repairs.

Minot Watkins Case.—In the case of Minot vs. Watkins, charging assault and battery, the defendant was assessed \$5 and costs by Judge Up-ton.

Redondo From San Pedro.—The steam schooner Redondo arrived in the bay Wednesday morning from San Pedro. The boat will take its usual cargo of boxes and ties.

Basket Ball Spirit.—The basket ball spirit has now struck the boys of the North Bend high school, and they have organized a basket ball team, with Marion Reynolds as manager. They have laid down the gauntlet to any team in Coos county wishing to contest them for basket ball honors.

During his two years' residence here, first as clerk with the Sengstacken pharmacy and later with McArthur, Mr. Erickson has made many friends who will regret his departure, but wish him the best of success in the future.

North Bend Council.—On next Tuesday, March 10, the North Bend city council will meet. It is expected that there will be interesting developments at this session, in connection with the saloon ordinance recently passed.

Ladies' Art Club.—Mrs. H. M. Tuttle will entertain the members of the Ladies' Art club at her home on Friday, March 6. On last Friday the ladies were entertained by Mrs. J. W. Snover, the hostess serving a delicious luncheon.

St. Patrick's Day Dance.—On the night of St. Patrick's day the Hahatankas will give a ball in I. O. O. F. hall. The affair will be invitational. The members of the Hahatankas dancing club give three or four functions of this nature each year, and they are always highly enjoyed by those attending.

The Rat Campaign.—Mayor E. E. Straw is leading the Marshfield rat campaign. Mr. Straw is now compiling copy for a number of placards to be posted at conspicuous corners in the city, informing all that the city will pay in good hard coin one nickel for each rat, dead, dying or alive, delivered into the hands of Jack Carter, marshal.

Ferry Celebration.—Eastside folks are planning a big celebration in honor of the dedication of the ferry to connect that city with Marshfield. Definite arrangements will be completed in the near future for this epochal occasion in the history of Coos Bay's infant child, Henry Sengstacken, who now enjoys the role of papa to the new city, will figure on the program.

Preparing for Potato Crop.—In a brief letter to the business office of The Times Charles W. Merchant, who is at the Merchants' ranch at Baulards, Oregon writes that he is busy preparing ground for a large crop of "Murphies" or spuds and hay. He expects to market his potatoes in California. Here's hoping the price will be as big as the crop, and both be large enough to make him a magnate and no "small potato" either.

Progress Club Meets.—The Progress club met Tuesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Henry Sengstacken. Samuel Taylor Coleridge and Robert Southey were the topics of the evening. Mrs. M. C. Horton read a paper on Coleridge and Mrs. D. Y. Stafford one on Southey. Both papers were excellent. Other members of the club gave readings of prose and poetry from these authors. The next meeting of the club will be on March 17.

Fire Boys Have Quarters.—The Marshfield fire department at last possesses quarters. At a meeting on Monday night the council dedicated to it the large new room recently opened in the rear of the council chambers. The new quarters will also be utilized as a rehearsal hall for the Acme band. It is the intention to make a trap door and install a pole, later on, from the quarters to the fire department on the first floor.

Curfew for Saloons.—Curfew is hereafter going to ring for the saloon keepers at midnight. Mayor Straw delivered this ukase to a Times reporter Tuesday evening. Said the mayor: "I want you to say that every night at 12 o'clock the city bell will be tapped once, as the signal for all saloons to close." (For the benefit of strangers—the city bell is the overgrown wagon tire which hangeth in the belfry over the city hall.) Listen for the bell.

Kills a Pelican.—Captain John Josephine, of the launch Teddy, Tuesday shot a fine specimen of pelican upon Haynes Inlet. He brought it back in the evening and donated it to the extensive collection in the Pullman saloon. Old residents and seafaring men say the bird is of very large size. It measures a little over seven feet from tip to tip of wings. Its bill is about fourteen inches long, while the lunch basket attached, commonly known as the pouch, will carry comfortably a good-sized fish. Pelicans are very rare inland, and it is the belief that the one now on exhibition was run ashore by the recent heavy storms along the coast.

Meetings Elicit Interest.—The special services being conducted by the Salvation Army in the local churches here have been increasing in interest each night. Brigadier Jenkins has proved an able speaker, and the songs by Major Faulkner and Adjutant Storey have been greatly enjoyed by all. Services will be conducted at the school house in Algony Wednesday evening. Thursday evening a meeting will be held in the Baptist church. An open air service will be held Thursday noon and in the evening.
