Good Roads.—G. G. Swan, of Gravel Ford, made the Sentinel a pleasant call while in the county seat Tuesday. Mr. Swan informed us that the people of his neighborhood are in favor of good substantial roads, and think the money well spent if the county commissioners will insist on substantial roads, and in his opinion from observation the best plank roads are made by laying the plank on the ground, without stringers, and driving them down with a heavy maul.—Sentinel.

In all probability the franchise will not be granted, as it is considered by many of our people a scheme by which the person asking for it seeks to sell it in the future to the highest bidder, as he asks two years in which to build the line.—Coquille Sentinel.

County Lecture Course.—Superintendent W. H. Bunch was in Myrtle Point Tuesday. Mr. Bunch is endeavoring to arrange for a lecture course for the five towns of the county that will consist of at least three lectures, and he states that he has been successful as far as he has canvassed the situation. It is desired that one of the lecturers shall visit this section the latter part of this month, another in May and another during the session of the county teachers' institute which will be held here during the summer. Good speakers, one of whom may be Congressman Hawley, are expected.—Enterprise.

New County Road.—E. O. Carter, who has been taking subscriptions to pay the expense of opening the new North Fork road to the Cooper bridge, reports a fine degree of success. The amount of \$568 has been raised by subscription from private parties, \$186 of the amount having been subscribed by the people of Myrtle Point. The county court has agreed to give dollar for dollar for the work, so that a fund of \$1,135 will be available for the work. This, it is believed, will be amply sufficient for opening the road and grading it, giving the farmers and others a comparatively level roadway from the North Fork into town. It is expected that work will begin on the road as soon as the weather will permit.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.
