NO BRIBERY CHARGES MADE, SAYS LILLEY

Connecticut Representative Explains Allegations Before Congressional Committee.

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, March 12.—The special committee appointed by Speaker Cannon to investigate the charges made by Congressman Lilly that undue efforts had been made by the Electric Boat Company to influence legislation resumed its sittings today with all five committeemen present and the spacious room filled with newspaper men and other interested spectators. At the opening of the session Representative Lilly addressed the committee, saying that he desired to correct the impression that had been created by the report of the committee on rules to the effect that he had charged that members of congress had been bribed.

He denied that he made such charges, but said that up to the present time his accusation had been solely against the Electric Boat company and its predecessor, the Hollander company, and had covered the point that these companies had made efforts to influence legislation by congress. Mr. Lilly read a carefully prepared statement.
