NEW HOTEL IS DISCUSSED

Old Timer No. 2 Upholds Builders, While "Stockholder" Criticises Delay.

Editor Times:
You, of course, should print all sides of a question, so you may understand I don't blame you for printing the letter of "Old Time Resident" on the hotel question. Old Time Resident is to blame for uttering his thoughts. He can not know what difficulties are in the way of building a hotel. If he did he would have remained silent and allowed the hotel plans to take their course. Is not Old Time Resident one of a faction which opposes the building of a hotel on C. street? Is he not one of a class which has made so many hotel failures?

There are a number of reasons why the hotel has not been built. It was decided upon too late last summer to begin, and in the winter it has not been expedient. The plans of the architect have not been ready. Material has been too costly. There has been a financial stress. This is what the interested parties tell me. Old Time Resident, like many of his kind, is impatient when waiting for somebody else to move, but fearfully patient when somebody else is waiting for him. He has been here a long time. Why didn't he build a hotel before? Why didn't he fix up the streets? Why didn't he do a little paving? Criticism from an Old Time Resident who probably wants a hotel on his own high-priced lot and won't call anything a hotel unless it is there, is uncalled for. I have lived in this city a long time, probably as long as Old Time Resident, and I don't care who builds the hotel, except that I don't believe it best to spoil the plan to build the C street hotel by jumping on it too soon. We can't tell whether the hotel is really needed yet. If it is completed in eighteen months or two years we will know better whether it is a good investment. We who have lived a long time on the Bay know how such things go, and that it is best not to be in a hurry. Even if the hotel should not be built for five years, it would beat your correspondent's record all hollow.

OLD TIME RESIDENT NO. 2. The Other Side.

Editor Times:
I am a new comer and am interested in a hotel for Marshfield because I have property here and because I live here. I expect to live here and, in time, become an Old Time Resident. I subscribed money for the new hotel and paid in twenty-five per cent. If I could I would answer Old Time Resident, but I can't find out anything at all, and can't learn what is going on even by asking questions of the president and directors of the project. When I put up my money I was told that there would be a stockholders' meeting in six months. There hasn't been any called, and nobody seems to know what will be done. I heard that Mr. Lockhart was in San Francisco and Mr. Chandler said the hotel would be built when the architect's plans were ready. I heard that the plans were ready some time ago. I also heard that the plans were not quite as desired. There has been a long time to correct them, and I can't see anything in that view.

I hope this hotel won't vanish into hot air. There are hot air hotels all around the bay, but I put my money into this one because I thought the people who were at the head of it were not hot air people. I don't want to believe it now, but I would like to learn somehow what's what and when it will work out. As I can't find out anything by asking questions, I can't give Old Time Resident any better answer.

STOCKHOLDER.
