### NOTED RACE MAN DEAD.

#### Th Ford, Lawyer and Rider, Dies at Salem, Oregon.

Our boyhood friend, Th Ford, died at Salem a short time ago, possessed of a fortune of nearly two hundred thousand dollars, most of which he made as a lawyer. The first time we ever saw him he was astride the noted race horse, "Old Simon," on his father's track near Salem, and he landed his horse a winner in a six-mile race against "Kangaroo," a horse known by the old timers at the mouth of Rogue River, where he won all his races.

Mr. Ford never married, leaving his estate to various relatives, bequeathing also 39 watches or diamond pins, as they should prefer, to that number of his life-long friends. He left an untarnished name to gulf his memory, and so fades one of Oregon's best and most prominent men.—Port Orford Tribune.
