### WEATHER FORECAST.

WESTERN OREGON.—Fair to night with light frost; Thursday, fair and warmer.

Bettis Funeral Held.—Richard Coke and wife have returned to their home in North Bend after having been at Fairview for a week where they attended to the funeral of Mrs. Cokes' father, Mr. Wm. Bettis.

Gasoline is Low.—The price of gasoline has been going down for several days and this week reached 16 1/2c per gallon, an unusually low figure for this section. It is expected that there will be still further reductions.

Will Deepen Channel.—The Simpson Lumber Company's dredger has gone to Pony Inlet to deepen the canal from Reynolds mill to the main channel. This will be a great convenience in getting logs and lumber into the main waterway.

To Open Coal Mines.—L. C. Collins who formerly travelled through this section for Tillmann and Bendel has resigned to devote his time to property holdings in Coos county. He has some extensive coal interests near Riverton and he expects to arrange for their early development.

New Boats Building.—Ivy Condon is having a new gasoline boat built at the Holland shops. O. Willard's new passenger boat for the Coquille will be launched this week at Timmerman's. Capt. Hans Reed has started work on the new ferry to run to East-side and expects to build it 60 feet long, 22 feet beam and 5 feet deep. The Fairhaven, which Kruse and Banks are building for the brewery at North Bend, will be ready to launch soon.

MISS B. ANDREWS left Marshfield yesterday for her home in Minneapolis after having spent six months on Coos Bay with relatives. Miss Andrews came west for the benefit of her health, which has now so greatly improved that she has decided to return inland. Miss Andrews intends returning to Coos Bay during the next winter.

### Aluminium.

Aluminium is a white metal resembling silver, but only one-quarter as heavy. It is very malleable and in tenacity approaches iron. Exposed to dry or moist air, it is unalterable and does not oxidize or tarnish like most metals. Salt water affects it less than it does silver, tin or copper. Neither cold nor hot water has any action upon it. Sulphuretted hydrogen, the gas which so readily tarnishes the silver in households, does not act on aluminium, which is found to preserve its appearance under all ordinary circumstances as perfectly as gold does.
