

## TUESDAY HER "JONAH DAY"

Mrs. A. H. Stutsman of Marshfield, Victim of Much Hard Luck in One Day.

Tuesday is Mrs. A. H. Stutsman's "Jonah Day".

If you don't believe it, read this summary of hard luck that she encountered the day before yesterday.

Someone broke the windows out of her launch and sunk it, causing \$50 or \$75 damage.

Her cow broke loose and was placed in the city pound, requiring \$5 to get her out.

Her pet rabbits broke out of the cage and ate up a neighbor's garden, incurring their wrath.

Her young son fell off the North Bend dock and almost drowned in the bay before he was rescued.

All came in rapid succession but even fate couldn't overcome the cheery good nature of one of Marshfield's most able and best known business women. She immediately set to work righting things and Wednesday brought a turn of affairs that more than offset the grief encountered the day before.

The damage done to the boat is alleged to have been done by miscreants. Mrs. Stutsman has a clue to their identity and will have them punished for the contemptible trick. The launch, which she recently had rebuilt and was about to name the "Emma Francis," was standing at Tom Howe's dock. The windows were broken in and the craft sunk in such a position that a log nearby would have crushed in the cabin had it not been for the timely discovery by Tom Howe. The craft is being raised today and until then, the extent of the damages will not be known.

## NORTH BEND PLANT BURNS

Casting Department of Iron Foundry Burns—Department Forgot Nozzles.

Fire of unknown origin yesterday afternoon caused a loss of about \$500 at the North Bend Iron Foundry's plant in North Bend. The damage consisted largely of the destruction of the casting department building. Luckily the patterns of the company were saved.

The North Bend fire department made a quick run to the blaze but when they arrived, they discovered that the nozzles had been accidentally left at the fire house. The fire was spreading rapidly but they could not do anything until the nozzles were secured. Finally, some hose from the sash and doors factories adjoining was strung and the blaze, which was threatening to spread, extinguished.

The foundry is in close proximity to the sash and door factories and had it not been for the prevailing calm at the time, the latter would have been in serious danger.

## MAY BUY FIRE BOAT FOR COOS BAY SERVICE.

North Bend and Marshfield Business Men Discuss Feasibility of The Plan.

North Bend and Marshfield men are discussing the feasibility of purchasing and equipping a fire boat for use on the Bay. Owing to the numerous large plants, nearly all of wooden construction, near the water's edge, many claim that the fire protection would greatly improved by having a regular fire boat in commission.

The one boat under consideration in connection with the plan is the Katie Cook, R. D. Hume's tug. It is stated that the boat will throw four large streams four stories high and by purchasing additional hose would be of decided advantage in fighting big fires at even quite distance from the Bay. It is understood that Mr. Hume will sell the boat for a reasonable sum.

## MAIL ROUTE IS CHANGED

After April 1st, North Bend Will Have Direct Service to and From Roseburg.

Notice has been received in North Bend that after April 1 that city will be given improved mail service to and from outside points. This will be done by changing the Roseburg-Marshfield route to the Roseburg-North Bend route, thus making direct service and avoiding the delay that was caused by having to transfer the mail at Marshfield. It is claimed that this will mean the delivery of outside mail to the North Bend post-office several hours earlier than at present.

The North Bend Chamber of Commerce took the matter up with the United States Postoffice department sometime ago. Yesterday, A. Whisnant received a letter from Congressman Hawley in which was enclosed a letter from the United States Post office department announcing that the change had been ordered, as requested, effective April 1.

The change will be made by simply having the mail launch that now runs from Sumner to Marshfield making North Bend instead of Marshfield the terminus of its run. The mail is delivered at Sumner to the launch by the stage company. After April 1, the launch will stop at Marshfield and leave the mail destined here and then proceed directly to North Bend with the mail for that point. The outgoing mail will be picked up at North Bend, then a stop will be made at Marshfield to pick up the outgoing mail from here and the run to Sumner made direct.

## MRS M'LEOD WINS ACTION

Oregon Supreme Court Decides In Favor of Marshfield Woman.

The case of Frances McLeod of Marshfield vs Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph Company was decided in the Oregon Supreme court March 24 in favor of the plaintiff, reversing the decision of Judge Harris rendered sometime ago.

It was an action brought by Mrs. Frances McLeod, Court stenographer, against the Telephone Company for failing to call her to the phone and by which she lost employment to the extent of \$1,280. Judge Harris held that as she was not a party to the contract, the Telephone Company did not owe any duty to her. The Supreme Court holds that the Telephone Company is responsible to the receiver of the message as well as to the sender, when the former would be benefited by the call being delivered, no matter whether she paid for the message or not.

## Other Cases Up.

The tax case of Mrs. M. E. Hall vs Eugene O'Connell was decided in favor of the plaintiff. The Supreme Court affirmed the decision of the lower court in this action.

The case of E. O. Hall vs Eugene O'Connell has not yet been decided by the Supreme Court.
