

SAY BERWICK TOTAL WRECK

R. D. Hume Hopes to Save Engines from Schooner on Suislaw Spit.

R. D. Hume, the Rogue River Salmon King, who has been spending the last few days on Coos Bay, has been advised that his gasoline schooner, The Berwick, which recently ran aground on a spit at the mouth of the Suislaw river during a fierce gale is practically a total wreck. He has sent some of his men to Florence to inspect her and to try and save the engines.

If the Berwick is as badly damaged as is reported, Mr. Hume expects to have a new boat built at once. He figures on utilizing the engines of the Berwick. He is now considering a ninety-foot craft with an eighteen-foot beam.

Hume Buys Enterprise.

R. D. Hume has closed his negotiations for the purchase of the launch, Enterprise, from J. R. Miller. It is understood that the consideration was about \$6,000. The Enterprise is now at Coquille and just as soon as she returns, she will be turned over to Mr. Hume who will at once send her to the Rogue River. He may make the trip on her.

DEMOCRATS TO MAKE FIGHT
