CARNIVAL ON WATER TALKED

Boat Owners and Others Interested in Aquatic Sports Discuss Plan.

A number of Coos Bay boat owners are discussing the advisability of conducting a water carnival here during the Second Southern Oregon District Fair which will be held here August 26 to 29, inclusive. The matter has just been taken up and will be investigated before any decision is reached.

Sec. Walter Lyon of the Chamber of Commerce has been consulted concerning the project and while he has not had the opportunity to investigate it, he is in favor of it if suitable arrangements can be made. He believes that it would be a fine additional attraction for the fair crowd and furnish diversion in the evenings which, without something of this kind, will be difficult to arrange. The water carnival would mean the lighting up of the bay and the docks and the participation of all boats possible, nicely decorated and drilled, in a series of maneuvers.

WEDDERBURN MAN KILLS LARGE BEAR NEAR TOWN.

WESTERN OREGON.—Fair to night and Wednesday. Light frost tonight with westerly winds.

Alliance in Wednesday.—The Alliance is expected in Wednesday from Portland and will sail on the return trip Thursday or Friday.

Another Candidate.—In a card published elsewhere Levi Smith of Marshfield announces himself as a candidate for the Republican nomination for sheriff of Coos county.

Will Return Saturday.—Dr. J. T. McCormac and daughter, Miss Alice, who have been making a few weeks tour of northern cities, are expected home Saturday. They will return via Drain.

Czarina is Coming.—The Czarina, the Southern Pacific steamer, is expected in Coos Bay within a few days. She sails from San Francisco and will load here with lumber for the south.

Plant in Friday.—Agent F. S. Dow has been notified that the M. F. Plant will sail from San Francisco Wednesday instead of Tuesday, consequently not reaching Coos Bay until Friday. They will leave Saturday on the return trip.

Telegraph Wires Down.—Manager Schetter of the Western Union, is having troubles of his own today as a result of his wires going down. The test showed that the break was near the mountains. It is believed that it was caused by a falling tree.

Headquarters in Aberdeen.—In a letter to The Times Al. Waterman requests that his address be changed from Marshfield to Hotel Washington, Aberdeen, Washington, which is to be his future headquarters. Many good wishes will follow him there as well as the copy of The Daily Times.

Papers as Life Preserver.—Arthur R. Penalty on Taxes.—Every taxpayer in Coos county who does not pay one-half of his taxes before April 6th, will have to pay a penalty of ten per cent and, in addition, interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum. By paying one-half before April 6th, six months grace is gained on the other, without interest.

Expect Trout Run.—The April run of trout on Coos River is being expected daily by the anglers. For several days, a number of good trout have been caught but the run has been light so far. It is claimed that the ones landed so far have been the ones that went up the river to spawn and are now seaward bound.
