Goes to Arizona.—W. H. Gamble, the well-known Coos Bay businessman, is planning to leave Saturday for Tucson, Ariz., where he expects to spend considerable time.

Catholic Services Friday.—The Rev. Father Donnelly announces that there will be special services at the Catholic church Friday evening at 7:30. The services include the Stations of the Cross and Benediction.

Will Put on Boat.—N. F. Throne, one of the promoters of the new additions on the east side of the bay, is arranging to put on a special boat which will make four round trips daily within a short time.

Will Grade Street.—The Coos Bay Townsite Company and the Crawford Point Land Company have awarded the contracts for grading about two miles of streets in their new addition across the bay.

Entertains Club.—The Biographic Club was entertained this afternoon by Mrs. Jack Flanagan at her home. The subject for the afternoon was McCauley, the historian. Mrs. Flanagan reading a paper on his life and works.

Connell Meets Monday.—The Marshfield city council will meet next Monday night, that being the date of the regular quarterly session. Front street paving will probably be the principal matter up.

Brings in Machinery.—The Alliance yesterday brought in about sixty tons of machinery and supplies for the Gas and Electric company which was unloaded at Porter. The consignment included a large engine and boiler for the plant.

To Open Streets.—The city council is considering plans for opening Cedar street from Third to Front street and Chestnut street from Third to Eighth street. Final action has been taken but it probably will be within a few weeks.

Visits Friends Here.—H. H. Buhne, one of the wealthiest and most active business men of Eureka, left today for Portland after spending a few days with friends on Coos Bay. He was greatly impressed with the rapid growth and development of this section.

For Plank Paving.—The North Bend city council will meet in a few days when, it is expected, the special committee appointed to investigate paving materials will report. It is understood that they will report in favor of plank paving. About three blocks will be ordered put in at once.

Gets Consular Report.—Sec. Walter Lyon of the Chamber of Commerce is now receiving the daily U. S. consular reports from the U. S. Department of Commerce and Labor at Washington. They are particularly valuable in this section as they contain data concerning its trade and shipping.

Visits Coos Bay.—E. D. La Chance of Hibbing, Minn., is spending a few days with his old friend, Jake Goldie, in Marshfield. Mr. La Chance has been engaged in the ore business at Hibbing which is one of the best producing points of the Great Lake ore region, over 13,000,000 tons having been shipped out of there last season. So far, Mr. La Chance is very favorably impressed with this section, the glowing letters from Mr. Goldie not having even equalled the situation. He may decide to remain here and that he will is the wish of those who have met him as his pleasing personality and natural boasting nature would help Coos Bay.
