Milk Condensary Starts.---The North Bend Milk Condensary, which has been closed during the winter months, reopened today. J. H. Keating, the manager, has returned from Portland where he has been spending a few months and will have charge again.

School Bonds Sold.---School district number 3, which recently voted the issuance of \$40,000 in bonds for improvements has placed the entire issue with Morris Bros. of Portland, who paid \$101 premium for them, the district receiving \$40,101.

First Asparagus Exhibited.---The first asparagus raised here this season was on exhibit Saturday at Sach's grocery store, it being brought in by S. W. Sherman of Sunny Nook ranch on Coos river. This is said to be unusually early but the quality was good.

Council Meets Tonight.---The regular quarterly session of the Marshfield city council will be held tonight. It is expected that final action may be taken on the front street paving problem. The South Marshfield sewer may also be discussed.

Alliance Sails Tomorrow.---Agent L. W. Shaw today received a telegram announcing that the Alliance would reach Coos Bay from Portland in the morning. She will sail from here on the return trip in the afternoon, the idea being to get her back on the old schedule.

Four years ago, Mr. Hume endeavored to secure the Republican nomination from this district for State senator but was defeated in the convention by J. S. Coke of Marshfield. Mr. Hume's decision to cut loose from party affiliations came as a surprise to local politicians.

COOS COUNTY FRUIT MEN WILL ORGANIZE.

Coquille Valley Growers Arrange To In Others Throughout County.

At the meeting of the Coquille Valley Fruit Growers association at Myrtle Point, arrangements were made for the organization of the Coos County Horticultural association for the benefit of the fruit growers of this section. The new organization is to be perfected at the next regular meeting in Myrtle Point, the first Wednesday in May, when each of the associations in the county will be expected to have representatives present.

The plan is to have the one county association with local associations in each locality, the local bodies having meetings as frequently as they see fit and the county association to meet once a month. The county association is to be incorporated.
President T. M. Herman and Sec. Swan will send notice to the various other associations and urge them to appoint delegates to the next meeting at Coquille so that every organization will be represented there. Dr. M. G. Pohl, fruit inspector for Coos County, is also working hard to get the new association organized on the right basis. He believes it can do much for the benefit of the fruit men.
