Sailors Raise Purses and Place Monument Over Friendless Lad's Grave Here.

A monument purchased in Portland by Captain Magenn of the Steamship Breakwater with money raised among the members of the crew has been placed over the grave of A. M. Ollava, the cabin boy, who was accidentally killed a few months ago. The lad was caught in the bow of the steamship which was crushed in by the breakers near the bar. He had no relatives in this country and was buried in the Odd Fellow's cemetery here. The monument which was purchased in Portland was sent down and Agent McCollum of the Breakwater had it placed.

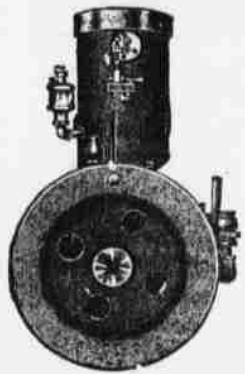

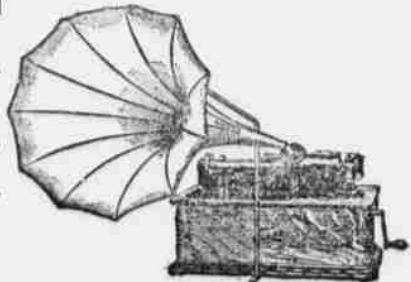
