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TO ARRANGE FOR BUILDING

Marshfield School Directors Meet Tomorrow to Determine Upon Structure.

The Marshfield Public School Board will meet Saturday morning at 9 o'clock to make final arrangements for erecting a new school building here, the appropriation for which was recently voted.

E. W. Hendricks and F. A. Legg, two Portland architects, arrived today to consult with the board relative to plans and specifications. President J. W. Bennett and the other two members of the board, Dr. J. T. McCormac and W. B. Curtis are determined to make the new school one of the best possible.

It is likely that arrangements will also be made tomorrow to close the option on the four-acre tract, northwest of the cemetery, as a site for the new building.

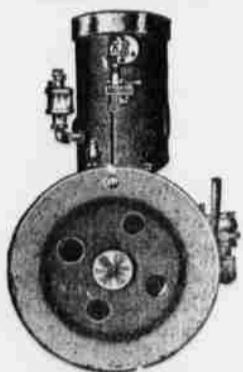
