Summary of Events as Told by the Port Orford Tribune.
A petition asking that prohibition be again submitted to the voters at the next election having been presented, the county court has directed the clerk to cause that question to be placed on the ballots, and we shall soon know whether the county shall be wet or dry.

Anderson Lamb, Marvin Hawkins and several other Coquille men spent a day or two in Port Orford last week hunting for timber locations in the lately approved Byer's survey, but as the land has about all been claimed by squatters for some time, it is doubtful if any new locations can be found.

Telegrams received here state that the Curry county witnesses at Los Angeles started home Sunday, and will probably be here by the middle of the week. It will be some time before the decision in the Land Fraud case will be made and whatever way it goes the case will be appealed, it is said, to the Supreme Court of the United States. EPISCOPAL DIVINES TO BE SENT HERE.

Bishop Scadding Arranges for Young Ministers to be Sent into Coos and Curry Counties.

Rev. and Mrs. William Horsfall of Marshfield were in the city Monday on their way to Bandon where he will hold services Sunday. Instead of holding services in this city on the third Sunday of the month he has postponed it until the fourth Sunday of this month. Rev. Horsfall informed the Sentinel that while Bishop Scadding was in the East he secured the services of five graduates of theological seminary, to come to Oregon with him and take positions in the different parishes of the State. Rev. Horsfall expects that one will be sent to Coos county to take charge of a part of his parish which extends from the Umpqua river to the Rogue river. One will be located in the Rogue river valley and the other three will have charge of settlement work in Portland. It is not believed that they will come to Oregon until September when Bishop Scadding returns from London, England.—Coquille Sentinel.
