### FLORENCE MEN TO GROW CRANBERRIES THERE.

Jesse Bounds and L. B. Canfield Will Endeavor to Start New Industry In Western Oregon,

EUGENE, Ore., April 14.—Jesse Bounds of Eugene, and L. B. Can-field of Cottage Grove, have just purchased 160 acres of land on the North Fork of the Siusiaw river, two miles from Florence, from Mr. Bounds' father, J. A. Bounds, and they will engage in the business of raising cranberries on the 20 acres of marsh land on the tract. Mr. Bounds returned this afternoon from Corvallis, where the deal for the land was closed with his father, who resides there.

Mr. Bounds stated to a Guard re porter this afternoon that he and Mr. Canfield will begin setting out cranberry plants at once and they will be bearing within two years from the time they are set out.
