FLORENCE MEN TO GROW CRANBERRIES THERE.

Jesse Bounds and L. B. Canfield Will Endeavor to Start New Industry in Western Oregon.

EUGENE, Ore., April 14.—Jesse Bounds of Eugene, and L. B. Canfield of Cottage Grove, have just purchased 160 acres of land on the North Fork of the Siuslaw river, two miles from Florence, from Mr. Bounds' father, J. A. Bounds, and they will engage in the business of raising cranberries on the 20 acres of marsh land on the tract. Mr. Bounds returned this afternoon from Corvallis, where the deal for the land was closed with his father, who resides there.

Mr. Bounds stated to a Guard reporter this afternoon that he and Mr. Canfield will begin setting out cranberry plants at once and they will be bearing within two years from the time they are set out. They will not set the entire marsh to the berries this year, but will gradually increase the acreage until the 20 acres are covered with the vines. This marsh is very similar to those on Coos Bay and in Tillamook county, where the berry is extensively grown and profitably marketed, and the promoters of the enterprise on the Siuslaw see no reason why they cannot make a success of the venture.
