## MRS. M. C. COLEMAN IS LAID TO REST.

Funeral of Prominent North Bend Woman Held—Gained Honor by Personal Effort and Ability.

The funeral of Mrs. M. C. Coleman, the wife of Councilman Coleman of North Bend, was held at the Presbyterian church in North Bend Tuesday and was largely attended. The body was taken to Marshfield for interment. The services were conducted by the Rev. E. E. Burkhardt.

Ella Coleman was born at Oxford, Mich., November 14, 1856. She was left an orphan at the age of nine, so that her early girlhood was not brightened by a mother's love and tenderness. While her educational advantages were very meagre, she, by her own efforts, added to an unusual degree. At the age of 20 she married Paul Daniels, a clerk of the United States Weather Bureau, and for four years following held a position in Washington, D. C. Her work there was on the compiling of a history. She resided in many different cities, and in each she won a circle of sincere friends. She remained longest at Williston, North Dakota.

At the death of Mr. Daniels, she was appointed to his position being the second lady to hold a position in that branch of Civil Service of the United States. She was always a true Christian and an active worker. A church erected at Williston stands as a testimonial to her untiring energy, as her friends claim that it could not have been built without her help. She was superintendent of the Sunday school, president of the Ladies Aid Society, and was always ready to help the sick and needy.

In 1902 she married M. G. Coleman, and two years later they moved to North Bend, Oregon. She was already suffering from an insidious disease of the brain which terminated fatally, and which so unfitted her for social duties that the few who became acquainted with her can never realize the bright and noble woman she once was. She died April 12th, at 12:20 a. m.

### CANDIDATE FOR COMMISSIONER.

Carter of Gold Hill, candidate for the Republican nomination for Railroad Commissioner, is peculiarly well fitted for the office to which he aspires, having during all of his residence in this State taken an active part in public life, and in Republican local and State politics. During his term in the legislature in 1901 his principal struggle was in support of the Colvig bill for a reduction of the passenger rate in Oregon from four cents a mile to three cents a mile. He also introduced a bill providing for the same reduction. He has at all times been identified with the development of the State, and he will receive a hearty indorsement from his friends in this district.
