## DEVERS TELLS OF COOS BAY

Well-known Marshfield Man Gives Interview in Boise, Idaho on Conditions Here.

That P. A. Devers, the busy Coos Bay booster, who is now visiting his old home in Idaho does not let up on his boasting even when taken a vacation is shown by the following story from the Idaho Statesman of Boise of April 23d:

"P. A. Devers, formerly cashier and one of the large stockholders of the First National Bank of Payette, but now of Marshfield, Ore., where he is president of the Coos Bay Securities-Investment Company, arrived in the city yesterday. He will be here and at Caldwell for the next several days looking after personal business affairs.

"Mr. Devers has now been in the Coos Bay country for about a year and a half and has great faith in its future. He stated yesterday that that country was affected to a certain extent like the rest of the northwest by the recent financial depression, but that the reaction had now set in there as elsewhere and a general feeling of optimism prevails.

"The Smith Lumber Company, headed by C. A. Smith, the Minneapolis lumber king, Mr. Devers said, was now conducting operations on a large scale there and the outlook for the rapid development of the Coos Bay country's immense lumber resources was bright. The company is now operating the largest coasting steamer on the coast in transporting lumber from Marshfield to San Francisco, having made its first trip out three weeks ago with a cargo of 2,250,000 feet of lumber, just a quarter of a million feet less than its full capacity. The company has one of its large mills at Marshfield with a capacity of 500,000 feet in two shifts.

"Mr. Devers said, too, that there were indications that the Coos Bay coal fields are to be developed on a more extensive scale than heretofore. The Harriman interests, he said, were especially active in this connection. Coal is now transported from Coos Bay to both Portland and San Francisco."
