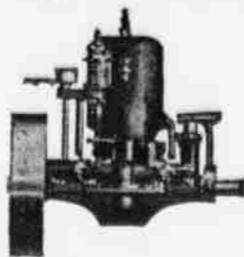

Takes Elevations. — City Engineer Sandberg today took the elevation in the lower part of the city to enable the government weather bureau to put in its instruments to enable Mrs. Dr. E. Mings to secure data on conditions here.

Wade is Injured. — Wm. Wade has gone to Portland to have a steel splinter removed from his eye. The injury was sustained while at work in the Nelson foundry a few years ago. It is very painful but it is hoped that no permanent defect will be sustained. Mrs. Wade accompanied him north.

Is Known Here. — It is said that Larkey Logan, the half-breed Indian who was convicted at Portland last week of manslaughter for the killing of Will Garner at Siletz recently, is a son of John Garner, a French-Canadian trapper and hunter who formerly spent much time around Coos Bay and the lower Umpqua.

Soon Reach Capacity. — The C. A. Smith mill will soon be running at its full capacity. It was originally expected that this would be about 250,000 feet for a ten-hour day but it is now believed that it will be about 300,000 feet, 240,000 feet having been cut several days recently.

Build Up Fishing on Bay. — There is a movement on to develop the fishing industry on Coos Bay and a cannery factory may be brought here. R. D. Hume, who has made such a success of the business at Rogue River says that he is certain the industry could be developed here at a good profit.

Commissioners Meet Soon. — The next session of the county commissioners will be held at Coquille, May 6th. In addition to the project of constructing a drawbridge across South Inlet, a number of road improvements will come up.

It is proposed to divide the fifty acres of bottom land into three-acre tracts and the river property into lots for summer cottages.
