Straw of Marshfield, A. J. Sherwood of Coquille, Dr. Stemler of Myrtle Point and Chris Rasmussen of Bandon were elected as a committee or printing.

The following were elected members of the executive and reception committee; T. W. Rennie of North Bend, E. E. Straw of Marshfield, A. J. Sherwood of Coquille, Dr. Stemler of Myrtle Point and Chris Rasmussen of Bandon. The precinct committeemen were urged to get busy and raise funds for the campaign and for any other purpose that may be authorized. Resolutions were adopted pledging the support of the party to Statement No. 1 and endorsing and approving the administration of Governor Chamberlain.
