To some extent The Insurance Press is an alarmist, indicating the frequency of school fires by publishing the record of fires in educational institutions in the United States and Canada in the first three months of this year.

It is only by presenting in bulk great need of increasing safe-guards in school buildings can be forced upon the mind, Brief paragraphs now and then and here and there of fires that endanger the lives of pupils do not hold attention long enough to enable one to realize the criminal carelessness in the maintenance of school buildings, the neglect to provide appliances to prevent the spreading of fire.

For the period mentioned the record is that of fires in public schools in localities in eighteen states and of other educational institutions in localities in nineteen States and one Territory, besides two localities in Canada.

The report of the superintendent of school buildings in New York City startled the public and aroused the authorities to action. In Philadelphia seventy-one school buildings were found defective. In Milwaukee sixteen of the school buildings were condemned. In Los Angeles three schools were found unsafe. The reports were merely indicative of conditions in other places.
