Overhaul Box Factory.—The North Bend box factory is closed for a few days while the building and machinery are being overhauled in preparation for the rush season.

Guard Against Disease.—L. Harrison, the Coos county livestock inspector, is warning livestock raisers to carefully inspect their stock lest an attempt to market diseased animals causes them trouble.

Plant Sails Thursday.—The M. F. Plant will sail from San Francisco Thursday afternoon, reaching Coos Bay Saturday and sailing from here on Sunday according to advices reaching F. S. Dow's office today.

Doyle May Run.—It is reported that M. Doyle of Wedderburn, is circulating petitions in Coos and Curry counties to have his name go on the June election ballots as an independent Democratic candidate for joint State representative from the two counties. This will make a contest for Colonel I. N. Muncy, the Republican nominee.

Undergoes Operation.—Tom Coats, who reached Marshfield on the Plant last Sunday was taken to the General hospital yesterday where he underwent an operation for appendicitis. Drs. Baumbaugh and Ingram attending him. The operation was successful and he was reported resting easy today.

Will Sell Hides.—Marshal J. W. Carter has attached a bundle of hides at Empire City belonging to G. N. Burns, in compliance with an order of Justice Pennock. The hides will be sold by Marshal Carter to satisfy a lien of R. E. Shine and others. Mr. Burns was formerly in the meat market business at Empire.

Has Scarlet Fever.—The home of L. R. Robertson was quarantined today on account of their little four-year old daughter being taken ill of scarlet fever. Mr. Robertson, who was away from home when the little girl was taken ill, has secured rooms down town and will not be affected by the quarantine regulations. The many friends of Janice and the family will hope for her early recovery.

Beals is Pleased.—District Forecaster E. A. Beals returned this morning from Coos Bay, where he established a reporting weather station. He is confident that daily data from there will prove of great value to the shippers and the public generally. The information will be forwarded from Marshfield twice a day and will be published in the daily weather map issued in the custom-house building each morning.—Portland Telegram.

The receipts for the past six months for the sheriff's office have been as follows: October, 1907, \$3,764.55; November, \$738.44; December, \$590.53; January, 1708, \$13,308.88; February, \$790.63; March, \$217,768.41.
