The Cleanup campaign is still being vigorously pushed in Marshfield, the ladies in charge of it being determined not to stop until everything is clean. Lyons of the Coos Bay Laundry. "Genial Jim" is not only in sympathy with the cleanup day movement but in making the contribution, he was prompted by another thing. The M. F. Plant has his laundry work done here each trip, the schedule being so that it can be turned out during the day or at night usually. On the last trip up, it was delayed and did not get in until late Saturday night. They had to have laundry and appealed to Mr. Lyons. He realized that it meant working on the Sabbath but rather than see the steamship go without clean linen, he secured a few of the employes to come down Sunday morning and help him get it out. It was purely accommodation on his part and in order to demonstrate it beyond the doubt of harping critics, he turned over the income from the work to Mrs. J. T. McCormac yesterday to be used to defraying the expenses of the cleanup movement.

MRS. S. A. YOAKAM'S UNCLE IS STRICKEN.

Silas Wesley Crane Succumbs to Cancer at Harrison, Idaho—Was Pioneer of That Section.

Mrs. S. A. Yoakam, dairy inspector for Coos county, has just been advised of the death of her uncle, Silas Wesley Crane, at Harrison, Idaho. Death was not unexpected as Mr. Crane had been suffering from cancer for a long time. Mrs. Yoakam visited him a month or so ago.

A dispatch from Harrison, Idaho, gives the following particulars:

Silas Wesley Crane, was a pioneer of the west and a resident of Harrison for 18 years. Mr. Crane took up the land where the village now stands as a homestead and for a number of years has been engaged in the general merchandise business here. He had always enjoyed good health until a few months ago. Cancer claimed him as a victim and death resulted. He leaves a wife and three sons: A. A. Crane, United States commissioner here; E. S. Crane, with the Washington Water Power Company, Spokane, and William E. Crane of Harrison. He was born in Hamilton, Ohio, May 5, 1833, moved to Oregon in 1852, where he married Elizabeth Jones in 1854, to them six children being born, three of whom are living. The funeral took place from the Methodist church.

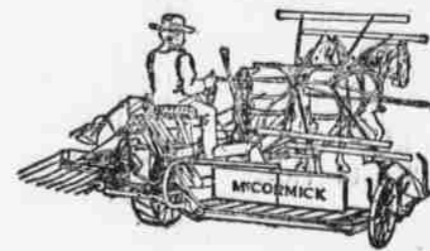

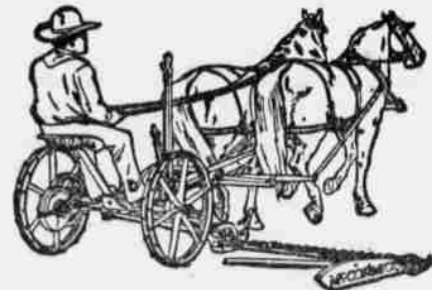
