MAY BUILD DRAW BRIDGE ON BROADWAY

Owners of Boise Addition Likely to Make Proposition to Marshfield City Council.

Judge K. I. Perky, J. R. Goode, Guy C. Barnum and the other owners of Boise addition to Marshfield, will probably tonight make a proposition to the Marshfield city council for the construction of a draw bridge across Coal Bank Inlet, leading to their property. It is understood that they will bear a good portion of the \$6,000 estimated expense and that the other benefitted property owners will assume the remainder of it.

The bridge will be located on Broadway and will continue that thoroughfare on out beyond South Marshfield. It is claimed that in addition to the bridge being of especial benefit to the Boise addition, it will be of general public benefit owing to opening up the thoroughfare.

Drawback Encountered.

Late today, it was understood that a drawback to the opening of Broadway and the construction of the draw bridge across Coal Bank Inlet had unexpectedly been encountered. The Merchant estate owns all of the property along both sides of Broadway for two blocks, beyond the inlet and they are not agreeable to the improving of the street at this time. The friends of the project are endeavoring to have the executors of the Merchant estate agree to the plan owing to the great advantages that the entire section across Coal Bank Inlet would derive from it as well as the benefits that the rest of the city would receive.
