Coats Funeral Held.—The funeral of Thomas Coats, the young man who died at the General hospital Saturday following an operation for appendicitis, was held yesterday, the Rev. D. W. Thurston officiating. It is possible that the body will be moved later to his old home in Shannon county, Missouri.
