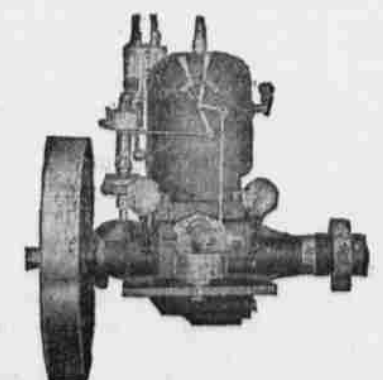

Will Elect Teachers.—The Marshfield school board will meet this afternoon to elect teachers for the ensuing year. No important changes in the present corps is expected.

Ferry Nearly Done.—Judge Hall stated today that he had been informed that the new ferry boat would be ready for launching in a few days. The other work will be rushed and it is hoped to have it in operation soon. There is a lively contest on for the job of operating the ferry but the commissioners will not decide it for a short time yet.
