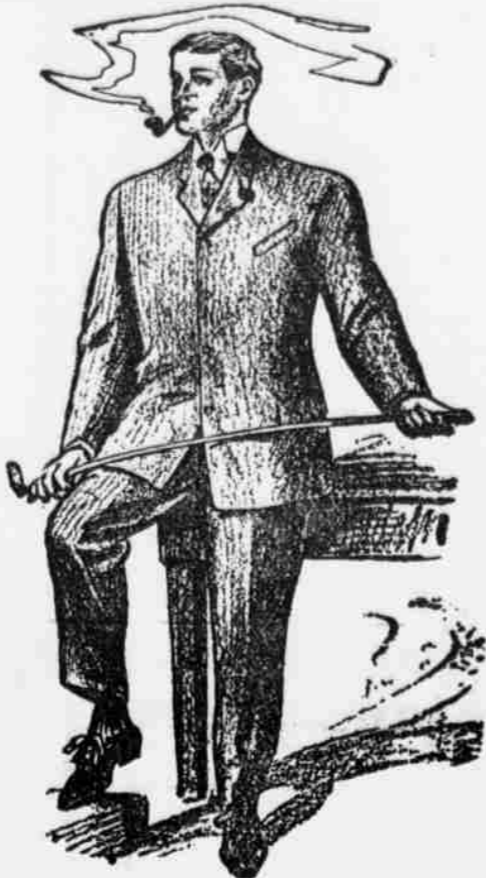

## RECORD TIME TO COOS BAY

Breakwater Makes Run From Portland to Marshfield in 21 Hours and 55 Minutes.

The steamship Breakwater, Captain Magenn, reached Coos Bay early last evening, breaking all previous records between the two points. The running time from the Portland dock to the dock in Marshfield was just twenty-one hours and fifty-five minutes, excluding an hour for a stop at North Bend and thirty minutes for a stop at Astoria.

The Breakwater left the Portland dock at 9:20 Wednesday night and had favorable tide for the Astoria and Coos Bay bars. The sea was as quiet as a mill pond and the steamship was kept under a high speed the entire distance without opposition from the elements.
