COOS COUNTY MAN ARRESTED AT ROSEBURG.

Wm. Kinnicutt of Myrtle Point,
Placed in Custody There on
Serious Charge.

ROSEBURG, June 4.—Charged
with contributing to the delinquency
of a child, Wm. Kinnicutt of Myrtle
Point, was arrested in this city by
Officer Palm, upon a warrant tele-
graphed from Marshfield. After in-
carceration in jail for several hours,
Kinnicutt gave bail through a friend
and then departed for Coos county.

FAITH IS SOUND IN S. P. CLAIMS.

Clatskanie Men Take Up Residence,
Despite Warnings From
Washington.

CLATSKANIE, Ore., June 4.—Al-
though official information has been
sent out from Washington that it is
useless to try for preferred rights
on Southern Pacific land grant
claims, suit to cancel which has been
filed, ten local people have gone out
to take up residence on these lands.
Some have their families with them
and are squatting; others are "batch-
ing." Their attorney, Lafferty, tells
them they cannot fail, as their
claims will be "preferred," since they
made application to purchase before
the Government filed suit for can-
cellation.
