LIVELY AT THE FAIR GROUNDS

Fifteen Horses In Training and Work On Pavilion Has Been Started.

The liveliest spot around Coos Bay at present is the Fair Grounds. In addition to the men and teams at work clearing places for the new pavilion and the addition to the grand stand there are fifteen horses for the races already on the grounds with trainers and rubbers. These animals are being put in form by being worked out each morning. Among the horses at present on the track are the following:

Greenlaw a three-year-old runner being trained by M. H. Nay.

Poster, a promising two-year-old, that M. H. Nay expects some good things from the coming season.

Gold Beach is one of L. M. Noble's horses that expects to be in the money this season.

Zomoak, a trotter out of Zombra and Redoak, has shown up well in the early workout, and is being handled by Dan Star.

"Belle," a trotter sired by Bonnie Direct is a horse that much is expected from and shows up well in the preliminary work. Dan Star is in charge of her.

L. J. Simpson's string of four runners is being handled by T. J. Armstrong. "Headlight" sired by Joe K. Dam, Tennessee Maid shows up well in the tryouts.

"Adonde" by Gerolstein and Lulleme is another horse that much is expected from during the season.

"Toscosa" a three-year-old chestnut filly that is doing fast work in training.

"Verona" is another promising youngster that will show up well in the coming races.

"Verona" by Tom Cromwell, is doing good work in the preliminaries.

"Creserton," by Imported Severton out of Crescent, has already proven a good horse and will add to his laurels this year.

"Dr. Rowell" proved his mettle by winning \$1,185 in the Seattle races last year.

There are two green horses from the Atlas stock farm in California that are looked upon with favor.

In addition to the above horses already at the track there are a large number of others that will be in later. A. E. Fry has written that he will have Brookwood and Snark here. Snark has the world's record for 5 1/2 furlongs made at Yonkers, New York.


